Come July 2nd peaceful Camp Norval will erupt with the noise and shouts of approximately 150 boys, turned loose for the summer. Three new cottages are being constructed to add to the present twenty, which nestle among the trees.

In addition to the cottages, there is a large main dining room, a hall for activities and three other permanent wintered buildings.

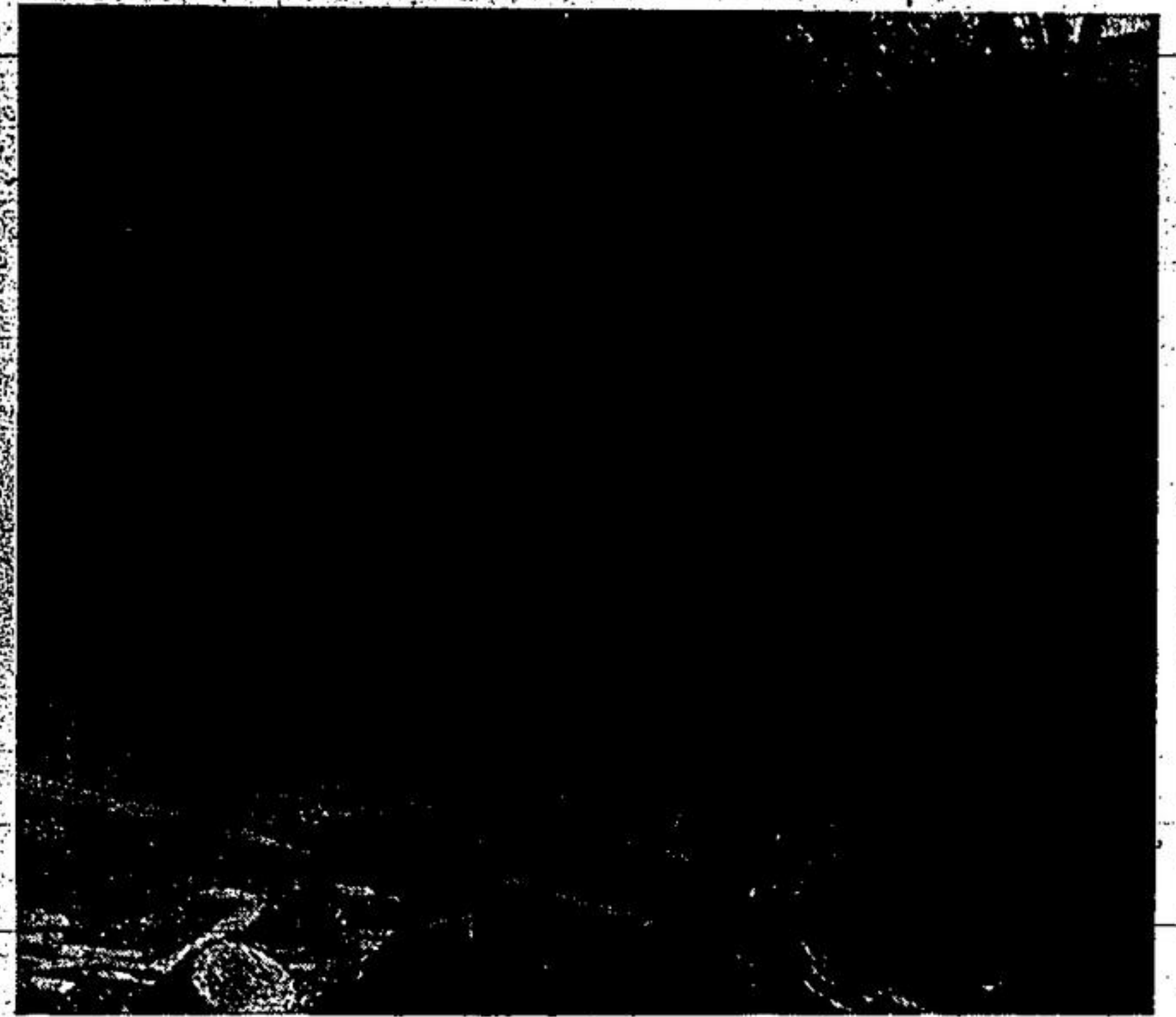
Altogether there are five heated

buildings which are in use all year round, mostly on the west end. There is no lack of things to do, with a swimming pool, two tennis courts, an athletic field and one hundred acres of woods and river to explore.

The hundred acre site was donated to the West End Y.M.C.A. by Wm. Nielson, of Nielson's, chocolate, back in 1925, and has been in continuous use ever since. Anyone can apply

to attend the camp, it is not necessary to belong to the West End Y. According to Superintendent Sam Hall the boys come from all over to stay either two or three weeks.

In June, before the avalanche of boys, many companies use the grounds for picnics, among them, appropriately enough, the Wm. Nielson Co., who will hold their picnic there a week from Saturday. Seven hundred are expected to attend.

Switch Nassagaweya, Now To Vote With Burlington

Halton MP Harry Harley said today he is pleased with the decision of the Ontario Electoral Boundaries Commission to put Nassagaweya Township in with Burlington for purposes of federal voting.

The Commission reported Friday that this was one of a number of changes in riding boundary lines made as the result of representations and objections made since the Commission's initial report.

Dr. Harley said the township itself had filed an objection and he had done the same thing on the floor of the commons when the redistribution debate was held. The change means that the township will now be in-

cluded in Halton-Wentworth riding instead of being part of the Wellington riding. It increases the Halton - Wentworth riding population to 57,183.

The Halton MP said that the township was normally associated with Burlington and the lines of trade and communication tended to link the two.

The new riding of Halton remains unchanged by the commission.

Final boundaries of federal election districts were made public last week, reflecting changes in only four provinces from original proposals placed before the Commons early this year.

Survey Will Determine Halton's Library Needs

A committee has been set up by the South Central Regional Library Co-operative Board to begin a detailed examination of library services in the counties of Brant, Halton and Wentworth. The study will establish which areas are without adequate library service and in what ways the service needs to be improved.

With this basic information the Regional Co-operative expects to set up realistic objectives for its future programs. The survey will, in fact, be used by the Regional Board to back up its requests for funds from the Provincial Library Service.

Such applications will be in by the May 30th deadline.

Several board members and guests commented on how useful the recent Architectural Building Workshop has been, and reported on follow-up action that had been taken. Another workshop, on the training of library workers, is being considered for the fall.

The Regional Board decided to send a member to the Canadian Library Association's annual convention to be held in Calgary in June.

The May meeting of the Regional Board, held last week near Georgetown, welcomed librarians and library board chairmen from North Halton libraries. Present were Miss G. Jackson and Mr. G. Lee of Acton, Mr. R. Mackay of Milton, and Miss M. Nazer and Mr. H. Allen of Georgetown. As there is at present no trustee on the Regional Board from the North Halton area, it was suggested that the local libraries appoint a representative who would attend the Board's meetings. Mr. Mackay of Milton was chosen.

The next meeting of the Regional Board in June will consider applications by member libraries for funds for special projects. It is expected that all
