

Skilled Workers Are Particularly In Demand, Notes NES Office

The area office of the National Employment Service recorded 360 job placements during May, announced C.B. Fraser, Manager.

This figure is for the entire area served by the Brampton office and includes Bramalea, Georgetown, Orangeville, Shelburne and the surrounding rural areas, he added.

Agriculture claimed 36 of these workers, 11 of whom came from outside areas. Four men were placed with local quarries while manufacturing industries accepted 188 NES referrals. The construction industry accounted for only 28 workers this May compared with 73 in May of 1965. "There are very few construction workers on our rolls at the present time," said Mr. Fraser.

Twenty-one workers were placed with firms in storage, transportation and communications. Industries engaged in wholesale and retail trade hired 52 workers through NES while service industries accounted for the remaining 35.

SKILLED WORKERS
The demand for skilled workers continues at a high level with at least two firms sending representatives to the U.K. and Europe during the spring. The demand continues for machinists, toolmakers, die setters and other skilled machine shop workers as well as for fully experienced construction equipment operators and maintenance mechanics.

Male university students who have registered with the NES for summer jobs have been placed and the demand for these young men is fairly heavy again this year, said Mr. Fraser. When the older high school students become available later in the month this demand should ease. Summer jobs for female university students have been slow this year and employers interested in obtaining the services of these young ladies should contact Mrs. C. Richardson of the NES Brampton, Mr. Fraser said.

NEW PROGRAM
As part of the measures to strengthen and expand services of the National Employment Service, several officers have been promoted into the new Employment Service Officers series.

Church Property Taxable If Used For Other Purposes

Halt County assessor Robert Beach said today that churches can be taxed on buildings that are not used for church activities.

"I think if it can be proven that a building is used for other than church purposes that it can be taxed," Mr. Beach said.

The county assessor was asked to comment on a resolution of Milton council that religious organizations should be taxed if they rent out church halls.

Mr. Beach pointed out that churches are exempt from taxation by Section 4 of the Assessment Act if their properties are put to religious or church functions.

He noted that following a court hearing the municipality of St. Lawrence was allowed to tax a church which rented out cabins to tourists.

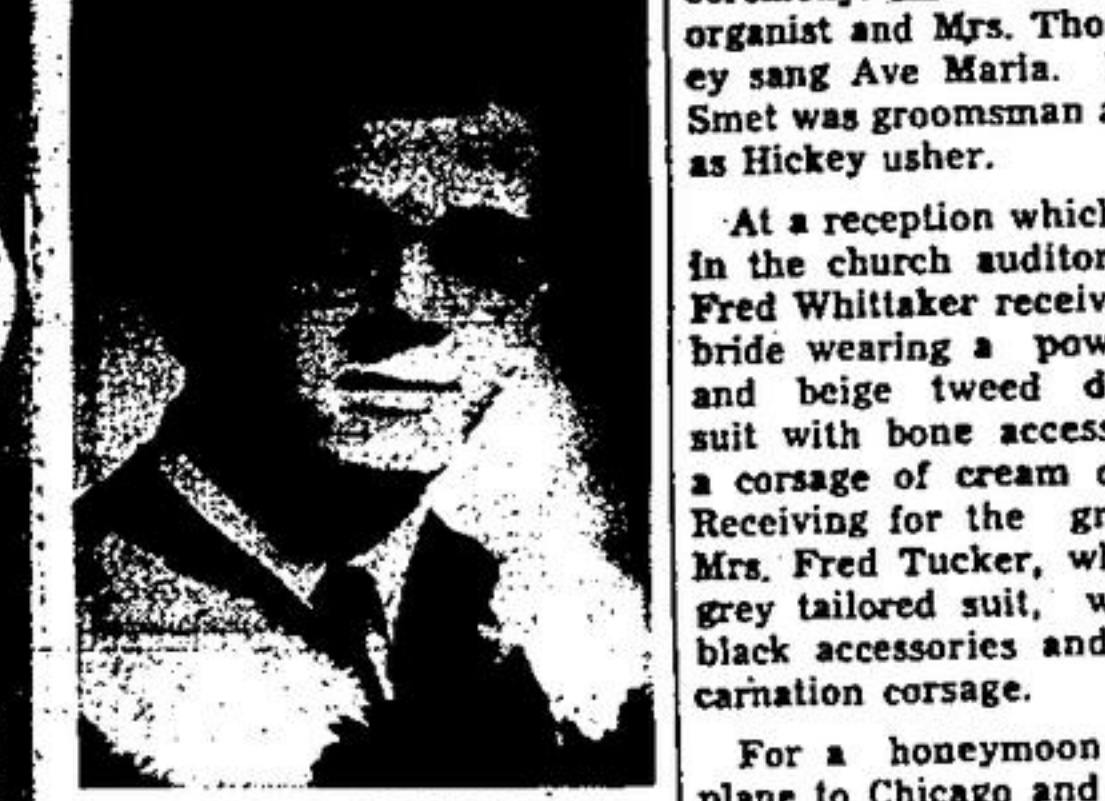
