### HAVE HOCKEY STICKS WILL TRAVEL

Seventeen youngsters accompanied by seven adults will near this welcome to the Mexican International Hockey Week, Aug. 10 when they arrive as the Winnipeg Bantam Ambassador Hockey Club.

This will, of course, depend upon kindness, warm generosity and loose purse strings of the Winnipeg public, and municipal government athletic supporting bodies.

Presently, the club's travel budget is not yet half completed. Besides taking part in the hockey tourney, team players will distribute 1967 Pan-Am Games pamphlets.

Finances now stand at 42.8 per cent — or \$4,000 shy of the \$7,000 objective. Where the remaining money will come from is not quite clear, but executive of the team feel all should be known by July 1.

Between the boys themselves, their community clubs and other recently activated groups, they hope to raise the greater balance of the \$4,000 by production of such things as car washes, pools on the Blue-Gold game, raffles, dances and bingos.

The boys will be billeted in only the best of homes in Mexico. Hockey sticks there cost at least \$6.

They will play three Mexican teams, one other Canadian club and possibly two American teams. The Mexican teams will range in age from 16 to 18, while the Winnipeggers go strictly with 14-year-olds.

Cost of one meal for the entire troupe would be \$40. If they were to go by car or bus, with three good meals a day, plus the added motel bills, then the trip would run well over the present budget, with car troubles always threatening.

Also noted was the fact that the adults accompanying the team are paying their own way, but two weeks holidays are all that any of them can afford at once.

The club has been seeking support in other quarters — such as the Pan-Am committee branches of government, and organizations connected with sport. Most have endorsed the idea and wished it luck, but nothing more.
