The first upset occurred on Tuesday, May 24th, when they travelled to Bramalea to open their season. Georgetown opened a two nothing lead in the first inning on hits by Riddall, Arbie and Ryder. They added one more in the third on walk, ground out and hit to Davison. Arbie pitched the route and held the Bramalea batters hitless and scoreless until the bottom of the fifth when Georgetown got careless. Bramalea opened with a double, Arbie walked the next batter, runners stole when Arbie went into a full windup and scored on an error to short-stop Ron Lane. On Sunday, May 29th, the boys really took it on the chin when they dropped another game to the young but eager Brampton team. Bowing to youth and drive they lost the game 3-2. Tost went the route and absorbed his first loss, giving up 5 hits, 3 walks, and hitting one batter. Georgetown took a 1-0 lead in the first inning on hits by Densmore and Tost. The Juveniles will try and prove they are better than their record on Sunday, June 12th when they travel to Brampton.

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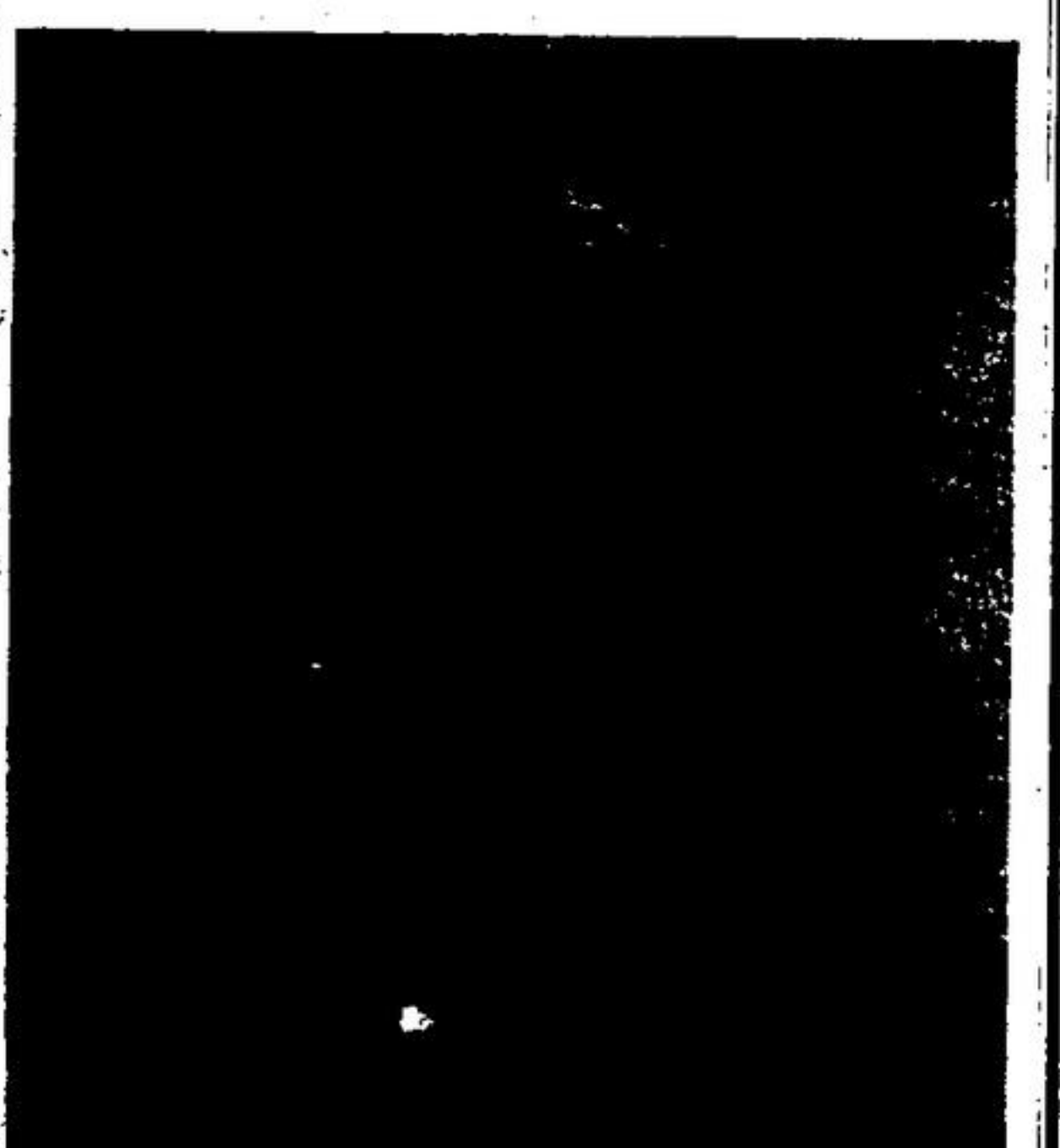
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
