### Consider Job Evaluation To Set Municipal Salaries

When assessment commissioner C. J. Hibbert requested substantial raises for himself and his staff on Monday, council decided to seek the cost of having job evaluations made of all municipal positions not covered by union agreements.

Mr. Hibbert pointed out that compensation for his position is much lower than the scale recommended by the government and is lower than assessment positions in comparative towns. His net salary, this year, he said, is lower than it was last year. Without adequate salaries there is little incentive for department employees to take the necessary university training courses, he said.

When Cr. Ballentine suggested the job evaluation, it found favour with a majority of council.

Cr. Hyde was in opposition. "We can do the job ourselves better than an outside firm," he said.

Cr. Ballentine pointed out that in council discussions personalities are sometimes injected, while a firm in the business can make an unbiased report.

### Final Price is \$2200 For Lot on Hyde Park

Booming real estate values in Georgetown are reflected in the price received for a building lot which council sold on Monday on Hyde Park Drive.

The town accepted an offer of John A. Mackenzie and voted for the sale for \$2200. Earlier this year Mr. Mackenzie had offered \$1300 for the property.

At the meeting a second offer was received for the same lot plus another, by which the town would receive \$2200 for each less 9% real estate commission. This was made by Charles Dykstra on behalf of John Medema.

The Mackenzie sale carried on a 6-2 vote. Reeve Hunter opposed it, saying the town should advertise the lots at \$2500 as a first come basis. Cr. Ballentine opposed a sale unless a building date promise is made.

A third offer, this for a Princess Anne lot for \$2100 from Joseph Pacholok was referred to the property committee.

### Bruises Foot, Ankle In Moterbike Accident

James Ornie Carter, age 19, suffered a bruised left foot and ankle when his light weight motorcycle collided with a car at the intersection of Mountainview Rd. and Guelph St. Wednesday afternoon June 1.

He was taken to Georgetown and District Memorial Hospital by a passing motorist and treated there by Dr. C.A. Thompson.

Police said the car involved, a 1961 Volkswagen, was operated by Donald Ray Carmichael, 40 Langston Cres. Carmichael was southbound on Mountainview attempting a left turn on to Guelph when the accident happened.

The investigating officer Sgt. George Louth, placed the time of the collision at 5:10. Damage was \$50 to the motorcycle and \$35 to the car.

### 350 Students Register For Summer Work

The Brantford office of the NES has registered 350 students for summer work so far this year. Very few of these students have specifically asked for work in harvesting operations says Mr. C.B. Fraser, Manager.

University students, who are available in May, usually succeed in finding employment before local growers require the services of pickers.

If last year's experiences are repeated most older boys and girls will be successful in finding summer work.

This leaves a pool of younger boys and girls who are available for fruit harvesting operations. While some growers have had excellent results with students in this group, and have continued to hire them for many years, others feel that more mature workers are needed if the crops are to be harvested at their peak. Growers who specialize in apples find that all students have returned to school before picking operations start.
