

Hell Drivers Promise Thrills in Kin Show

A twenty-two hour show in what Georgetown Kinmen will present when they bring the Imperial Hell Drivers to Georgetown Park tomorrow night.

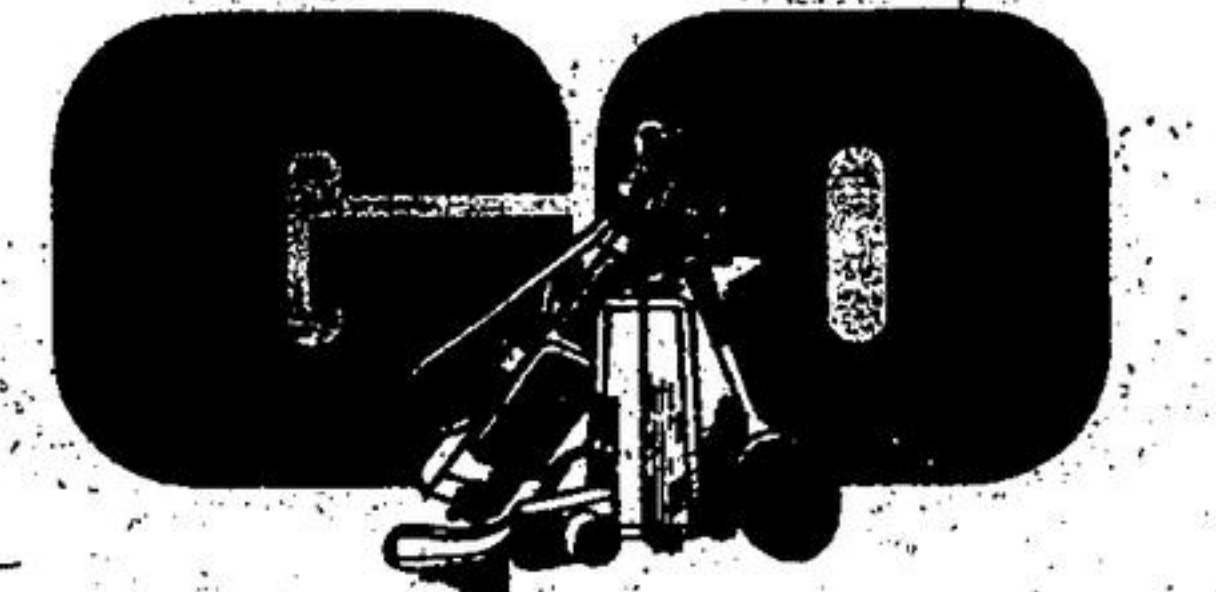
Class 4 Highlights North Halton Karts
