"Bible is Key to Combat Delinquency" - Witnesses

"Delinquency is successfully overcome as adults face up to their responsibility. Jehovah's Witnesses have largely been able to overcome this worldwide problem by applying Bible principles in their daily lives and the daily lives of their children," said Mr. Melville Taylor, presiding minister of the Georgetown Congregation of Jehovah's Witnesses.

Mr. Taylor made these statements when he reminded local Witnesses this week of their invitation to attend the five-day "God's Sons of Liberty" District Assembly to be held at the Canadian National Exhibition Grandstand. Among the more than 50,000 delegates expected to attend will be thousands of teenagers and younger children.

"Be sure your children attend this assembly," he urged, "because the information they will receive there will be too valuable for them to miss. If little children are able to learn the complex languages of their parents, they are able to learn the pure language of the Bible. You want them to grow up on a spiritual diet that is capable of turning them into mature Christian men and women. One cause of juvenile delinquency is adult delinquency. Take them with you so they will benefit by your example."
