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Police Can Now Tell Loiterers To Move Along

"Short and to the point. This will give our police the authority they need to eliminate situations they have been unable to legally cope with" said Cr. Ern Hyde at Monday's council meeting.

He was referring to a by-law which prohibits loitering in public places. The by-law received unanimous support when it was presented.

It provides fines ranging from \$10 to \$300 for infractions.

Cr. Hyde said the regulations would apply to plazas as well as to the downtown business district.

Garbage Collection Twice Weekly Set for July

"I've brought my garbage to let you smell what I will have to do until Thursday" said an angry ratepayer as he clanked a garbage can on the floor of the council chamber Monday.

Cecil Davidson, 10 Albert St. was soon soothed by the mayor who said it had already been decided to have twice weekly collection as in former years.

The three month summer schedule will cost taxpayers an extra \$260 to \$340 a week, as an extra packer and help will be needed. Pickups will be made on Mondays, Tuesdays, Thursdays and Fridays and collection days are indicated in an advertisement elsewhere in this issue of The Herald.

Merchant Sol Sherman Dies Suddenly in City

Sol Sherman, proprietor of Jackson's Bargain Centre on Main Street North died suddenly at the Branson Hospital, Toronto on Monday.

Mr. Sherman, a businessman here for eight years, took suddenly ill while attending a wedding in the city on Sunday. First associated with his uncle, the late Sol Sherman, in the store he later operated the business himself. Four years ago he purchased a building once housing a restaurant from the Deft Estate and made major improvements, adding a second floor for merchandise display.

Mr. Sherman lived in the city at 21 Almore Avenue. He leaves his wife Elka, children Sam and Sharon and a brother Abraham. Funeral service was held on Tuesday at the Park Memorial Chapel and interment was in Bathurst Lawn Cemetery.

Protest Double Charge For Museum Admission

Many people are objecting to a double charge they have to pay if they want to visit the county museum, Halton Region Conservation Authority was told this week.

William Coulter, reeve of Nasagaweya Twp., asked the Authority to give a grant of \$500 to the museum so it could stop its 25c admission charge.

Mrs. Jessie Lawr Dies

Struck Down By Motor Car

Mrs. Jessie Lawr, 69, was struck and killed by a car at 10 p.m. Monday night on county road No. 11 in Bellefontaine.

Mrs. Lawr was out for an evening stroll when the accident happened. She was the aunt of Shel Lawr, 27 Ewing St., and Archie Lawr, Ballinacree and sister in law of Mrs. Matt Lawr, 52 Main St. S.

The car, driven by Susan Parker, 20 Lynch Rd., Brampton, a nurse at Peel Memorial Hospital, went out of control after the accident crashing into the wall of a nearby house.

Mrs. Lawr was thrown from the roadway to the lawn of a house occupied by Mr. and Mrs. Tom Galloway.

People rushed from their homes to give the injured woman first aid, but she was dead before the ambulance, which arrived within ten minutes, could get her to Orangeville hospital.

Esqueusing Got Free Bridge Mayor Wants Equal Favour

A proposed overhead railway bridge on Mountview Road, quashed in a council vote recently, is back in the picture again.

Mayor Gibbons told council Monday that he has found the bridge at Glen Williams was paid 80% by the highways department and 20% by the county, and there was no cost to Esqueusing Township at all.

"I'm after a similar deal," he said.

The mayor said he had contacted the county and that a cost of \$108,000 would do the job in place of the estimated \$385,000.

Cr. Harrison said that Reeve Hunter has also been in touch with the county.

"You didn't seem interested in a bridge so we went ahead as ratepayers" he told the mayor. "The reeve has spent a lot of time on this."

"If we can save ratepayers two or three hundred thousand dollars I don't care who gets the credit" said the mayor.

Crown Attorney Wants Seat Belts in All Cars

Halton Crown Attorney Peter K. McWilliams said last week that it is high time seat belts were installed in all cars.

"I find it startling in 1966 that a car of any make is not equipped with safety belts" he told a coroner's jury in Burlington.

The Halton crown attorney said that of the 28 people who died last year in motor vehicle accidents in the county, 20 were thrown from automobiles. He said the remaining eight were in accidents in which the car struck a train or a bridge and probably would have died with or without seat belts.

Mr. McWilliams stated that he has been keeping traffic statistics in Halton for the last five years.

"There are too many deaths on the highways," he said noting that there were 40 road deaths in Halton in 1965 compared with 28 in 1964. There have been 11 so far this year.

"This is a very serious matter," he said. He said that the majority of the people who died in Halton last year were thrown out of a car and could have lived if they were kept in their cars by a seat belt.

Governor General Takes The Salute At Lorne Scots Trooping Of Colour

Glowing praise of the efficiency of the Lorne Scots regiment was expressed by Governor General Georges P. Vanier, when he took the salute at a trooping of the colour ceremony in Brampton Fair Grounds Sunday.

The ceremony was a highlight of the 4th annual Brampton Flower Festival.

"The regiment is a credit not only to the community but to the whole of Canada. It was a very, very fine show" he said in an address in which he departed from his prepared speech. He praised militiamen for the self-sacrifice needed to participate in the peace-time army, and spoke of the Lorne Scots' service in two world wars.

Saturday they will be part of the Burlington Jaycees parade in Burlington, and on Saturday, July 9 they're booked to march in the Orange parade in Shelburne.

The band currently includes eight pipers and eight drummers.

Need \$3000 Booster Pump For Silvercreek Water

With Deputy Reeve Jim Young and Mayor Gibbons opposing the plan, council okayed a \$3,000 water booster pump to service out of town consumers in the Silvercreek district on Monday.

Water chairman Arthur Speight explained that it is possible the booster will not be needed, but he wanted authority to have it installed should pressure be too low on the line with the new water tower in operation.

Deputy Reeve Young said the council has a responsibility to township consumers but an even greater one to town taxpayers. He would okay the pump if water rates were boosted from their present triple rates, he said.

Cr. Ern Hyde argued that in future Georgetown might want to use the Silvercreek line to bring water from a potential out of town source. If it were closed, he said, the town would lose its easement rights. "That's a selfish reason for the pump, but a good one," he said.

Mr. Speight said there is a water source on quarry property owned by Joe Frueyk which could be a future source for the town and said it could be difficult to deal with property owners if the town cut their water supply now for a matter of \$3,000.

He pointed out that 14 services in the township pay \$1512 yearly in water bills which would pay for the booster pump in two years.

Supporting the pump, Cr. Fred Harrison stressed that although he is a resident in that district, he does not hook into the town line.

Asking if the expenditure is in the budget, Mayor Gibbons was told that it had been included in the capital cost of the new water tower.

"I'm not too concerned about getting into trouble if we had to stop the line," said the mayor. "The residents would understand. There's no agreement that we are duty bound to supply water and we could spend \$3000 to better advantage."

"This reminds me of the western cattle barons who drew a fence around a water supply remarked Cr. Emmerson.

"There are people in the township who are paying business taxes in town. And we must remember they have put in their own lines to their houses at considerable expense."

The motion passed with Gibbons and Young in opposition.
