Leadership Training Seminar At Norval West End 'Y' Camp

A first for the Georgetown & District YMCA-YWCA in the field of leadership training, can be classed as a huge success. A leadership training seminar was held for all the 'Y' leaders, advisors, board and committee members on Friday and Saturday at the Toronto West End YMCA Camp Norval.

The program was designed to inform and educate the 'Y' personnel in the philosophy, history and application of the organization and the programming in an effort to provide leaders with a better understanding of their goals. Through the fun, fellowship and lectures, it is hoped they gained some of the 'Y' enthusiasm and spirit, and will present the YMCA-YWCA to the community as an organization with a solid place in the present, and an expanding role in the future of our Georgetown area.

The Friday evening registrations were followed by rousing get-acquainted games, swims and finally a welter roast and sing song. As part of all normal camp procedure, the camp character took over, leaving bedding, clothing, and campers alike in various forms of disarray. There was also a slight formality of camp initiation by the West End Counsellors, which took place only in the wee hours of the morning. This made the frivolity of the wake-up party all the more fun since they involved all cabins with gay costumes, songs, pots and pans, some two and a half hours before breakfast.

The lectures and discussion groups opened on Saturday morning with Miss Isabel Stewart of YWCA National Leadership Training and Miss Gwyn Griffiths. They spoke on the Philosophy and goals of the 'Y' and their meaning to the leaders. Miss Stewart also took the second session with the Board of Directors and committee members, delving into their function within the 'Y' structure and covering various problems they might encounter. At the same time, Mrs. Rita Munro, Y Day Camp Director took the leaders and advisors into a discussion

group covering leadership qualities and methods. A session on local history followed lunch, and was made most interesting by Mrs. Helen Van Sickler, president of the Georgetown Y Board of Directors and one of the original workers still actively participating. The World image of the YMCA came into focus when Mr. Modris Lorbergs, Camp Director of the West End Y Camp Norval, addressed the group. He spoke on the various interpretations of the 'Y' in the different countries. Having been a Y secretary for the past twenty years and working in many lands, he has a first hand knowledge of the YMCA standing proudly while assisting illiterate people to learn to read and write in order to emigrate to a new homeland, offering a home away from home in a hostelry to many weary travellers, and helping a backward nation teach modern methods in pig farming by setting up pig farms themselves in South America. He explained that the variety and the ability to adapt to the local needs, thus giving a different concept of the 'Y' in every land it dwells in, is the true picture painted by the YMCA-YWCA.

The Junior and Senior Day Camp instructors were given a day by day plan to work with in their next session by Mrs. Munro, thus preparing them for the Day Camp which begins on the 4th of July and runs thru to the 12th of August.

The remaining time at the seminar was spent enjoying the pool, tennis and basketball courts and hiking the beautiful trails. They wound up the session with a feast of turkey. The camp staff, the leaders and program chairman, Mrs. Marilyn Ottaway were all thanked by Mrs. Van Sickler for making the week-end an event to be remembered.
