Tom James' Squeeze Bunt Gives Giants 4-3 Win

The Georgetown Giants literally 'squeezed' a win out of the Oakville Oaks Wednesday night.

Giants' Tom James laid down a perfect squeeze bunt in the bottom of the seventh inning to score the winning run as Georgetown nipped the Oaks 4-3 in a Halton County Baseball League game.

The bunt ruined the pitching debut of coach Bob Bishop who stalked to the mound in the 6th inning when starter Dan MacLeod ran out of gas.

MacLeod had protected a 3-2 lead for the Oaks until the bottom of the fifth inning when the Giants rallied to tie the score.

Georgetown scored the winning run without getting the ball out of the infield in the seventh.

Slow Roller

Don Lindsay tapped a slow roller near the mound and was safe when first baseman Murray Hall couldn't hold Bishop's hurried throw.

Lindsay stole second base and when Bishop attempted to pick him off, the ball hit the second base and rolled into the outfield, allowing Lindsay to reach third.

James then tapped a perfect bunt in front of the plate and Lindsay raced home with the winning tally.

Bernie Dore gave up all the Oaks runs in the top of the second inning and then blanked them the rest of the way to

earn the win for Georgetown.

MacLeod Starts Righthander Danny MacLeod, making his first start this season, surrendered two runs in the first inning.

Dore limited the Oaks to eight hits while MacLeod gave just five safeties to the Giants.

Giants plated a pair of runs in the first inning on a slicing double by Dan Arbie, a line single by Dan Arbie, and a wild throw by second baseman Buddy McKay on a pickoff attempt.

Oaks appeared to have Dore on the ropes in the second inning when Murray Hall singled and Ross Dryden belted a double.

Bondy Homers Bondy followed with a tremendous homer on the road deep in left field, a blast that carried close to 300 feet, to give the Oaks a 2-2 margin.

A close call at second base allowed the Giants to tie the score in the fifth inning.

Bondy appeared to have a force play but dropped the ball.

The Oaks threatened in the bottom of the inning when Dryden powdered his second double of the night into deep center field and Bondy ripped a single. However, Dore managed to retire the side with no damage.

Campbell and James had two hits each for the Giants while Arbie picked up the other.

LET'S PLAY BRIDGE

The language of contract bridge is full of special names for types of plays that can be made. There is the squeeze, the end play, the upper cut, the Bath coup, the Vienna coup and many more.

Few of these names refer to defensive play, but there are two which are very similar in nature. These are the Deschappelles coup and the Merrimac coup. Both of these involve the sacrifice of a trick the former to create an entry in partner's hand and the latter to destroy an entry in dummy.

I had occasion to resort to a Merrimac coup in a rubber bridge match last week. Here are the hands with West the dealer and neither side vulnerable.

North
S-8 5 2
H-K J 10 9 7 5
D-Q
C-A 7 3

East
S-Q 9 8 4
H-Q 3
D-K J 9 4
C-K J 5

South
S-A K J 7
H-8 2
D-A 10 7 5
C-Q 10 6

The bidding:
West North East South
Pass Pass Pass 1D

The only part of the bidding that I wish to defend is East's pass. I held East's cards and at duplicate bridge, I would open this hand every time. But this was rubber bridge and I can afford to pass this kind of hand.

West led the spade ten in an attempt to hit my best suit. This was allowed to ride around to declarer, who won with the jack. Since hearts offer the best chance for tricks, declarer led a heart and played the jack from dummy. East won with the queen.

Now East knows that the diamond queen is not an entry. The thing to do is to knock out dummy's club ace. A low club is no good. Declarer will just win in his hand. The only card is the club king and this was led. Declarer won in dummy and realizing that the hearts were dead, led clubs for a finesse.

Even with this working there was no play for nine tricks. In all, declarer lost two hearts, two diamonds and a spade.

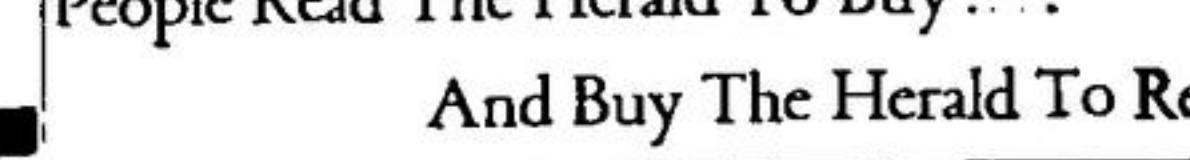

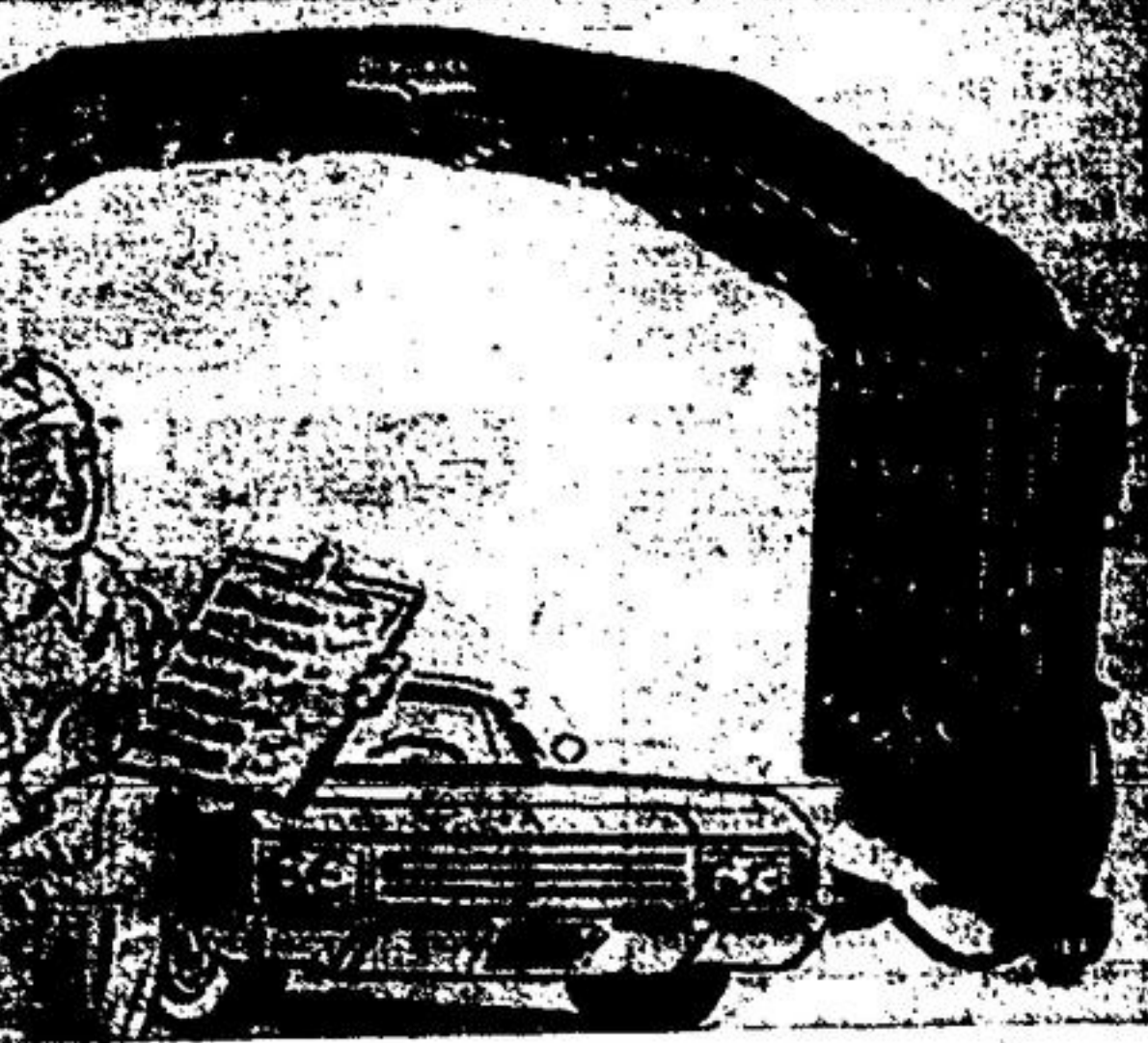
