ESQUERING COUNCIL

Veto Request for Septic Tank on Road Allowance

A house with scarcely any land, beyond the land it sits on, posed a problem for Esquering council Monday night.

Mr. Thomas Allen, Stewarttown, has no land of his own on which to install a septic tank, and had requested township permission to use a 16' unopened road allowance, known on old maps as Sawmill Road.

Two weeks ago, when the original request was made, Reeve George Leslie instructed Mr. Allen to obtain the approval of the sanitary inspector, the county road dept. (a county road would have to be crossed) and both adjoining neighbours.

However, Mr. Hall, manager of Master Feeds, protested strongly against a tile bed so close to the stream, and to Master Feeds' property.

After hearing Cr. George Currie state that a township road should not be used as a sewage outlet, and Clerk K. C. Lindsay explain that the township would be liable for damages if they gave their approval, Council turned down Mr. Allen's request.

The Reeve sympathized with Mr. Allen saying, "We know you're in a spot, but under the circumstances there's nothing we can do." He suggested the only alternative was to install a closed tank, which would be pumped out periodically.

"We can't make fish of one and fowl of another," commented Cr. Tom Hill, when Hornby Park Board requested snow fencing for their annual garden party.

"If Georgetown Fair Board gets it so should Hornby park board," agreed Deputy Reeve W. Leslie.

The lending of 90 ft. snow fencing and 50 posts to Hornby Park Board was approved, providing the fencing is picked up two days before the event and returned the next day. Any missing or damaged fencing will have to be replaced.

An engineering firm's approval to conduct a roads study for the township brought two brief comments.

"We can survey the condition of our own roads," said Deputy Reeve W. Leslie, and "We can use the money we would pay for this study to fix the roads" added Cr. Tom Hill.
