

Defeat Move To Restrict Roads Convention Group

A move to restrict attendance to the Canadian Good Roads Convention to only the Road Chairman George Leslie and the new County Engineer, Jack Corbett, was defeated 20-11 at Halton County Council last week. Instead four members of County Roads Committee, with the new engineer and the retiring roads engineer will attend the Halifax convention.

Burlington Deputy Reeve Frank Rogers spearheaded the objections noting the roads committee had already spent over two thousand dollars attending the Ontario Good Roads convention this year, and now wanted to attend the Dominion conference.

"If you're going on this overseas tour sponsored by the county you should sit down," commented Reeve Herb Merry to Deputy Reeve Rogers.

"Well I'm not going to England or Halifax," stated Georgetown's Deputy Jim Young, "and I question sending a man who is retiring from county service."

Deputy Reeve A. Day of Oakville suggested the county should be cutting down on attendance at conventions. "This looks like a good place to start if you go to the Ontario con-

vention, the Dominion one should be cut out," he said. Reeve Gordon Gallagher of Burlington suggested the members were being pleased. He maintained the attendance at conventions promoted good public relations for the county.

Milton Deputy Reeve C. Menefy wondered why the Good Roads convention was singled out. "They should all be dealt with under a policy."

A complete list of county memberships in associations should be compiled and reviewed at the beginning of the year, Reeve W. Coulter of Nasagawaya argued.

"If the Good Roads convention is deleted, all conventions including the overseas trip should be eliminated," opined Reeve W. Hunter of Georgetown.

Warden Herb Hinton felt the whole subject should be considered at the beginning of next year, but left alone for the balance of this one.

"It may seem I'm picking on the Good Roads convention," added Deputy Reeve Day, "but I was amazed to see how much was spent on the Ontario convention recently. I certainly don't think our public image

Going On Vacation? Police Chief Gives Precautions To Take

There is no guarantee that your home won't be broken into while the family is up at the cottage for summer. But there are a few simple safeguards that will go a long way in protecting you from burglars and the passing tramp.

Georgetown Chief Constable Roy Haley calls them just common sense rules of safekeeping a home.

When you lock up for the summer, notify neighbours and police that you are going. Let them know who, if anyone, is allowed in the house to water the plants and take care of things, he suggested.

Have the lawn cut weekly. If possible have someone change the position of drapes and vary the location of the light left at night.

The best way to safeguard your house is to make everything appear as much as possible as if someone were still living in the house, according to Chief Haley.

Don't advertise your departure in the social column of the newspaper, he advises. Wait until you get back to make public your trip.

Travellers' cheques are an old standby to make sure your money is safe enroute.

Your jewellery and other valuables should be kept hidden. Most hotels have safes or boxes for their guests' use.

And when you are wearing jewellery, Chief Haley advises to be conservative about showing what you have.

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Citizens Band Asks Town Provide Bandstand Lumber

On behalf of the Georgetown Citizens' Band, Dave Hastings requested council Monday night to consider a grant of \$500 to cover the cost of lumber for a three-tiered portable bandstand.

The band would like to hold Sunday evening concerts at Cedarvale Community Centre occasionally, bringing in outside bands. The band have been asked to appear at Expo '67 for a four day stint, he told council, and feel they need more appearances before the public to ready themselves for the Centennial show.

This amount would cover the lumber costs alone, said Mr. Hastings, since the labour and the tools will be donated. He explained that the \$1500 yearly grant just barely carries the band. "After paying for the upkeep of instruments, music, and the rental at Cedarvale, the most we could have left would be \$200," he explained.

Cr. W. Smith felt a portable bandstand could be an asset, and suggested the request be turned over jointly to the Recreation and Finance committees.

Cr. A. Speight felt a permanent bandshell on Cedarvale grounds would be an asset to the town.

"Since finances are involved the request should be considered here," commented Cr. Hyde. "We'll know where we stand better after the interim statement in mid-July."

The request will be considered in committee.

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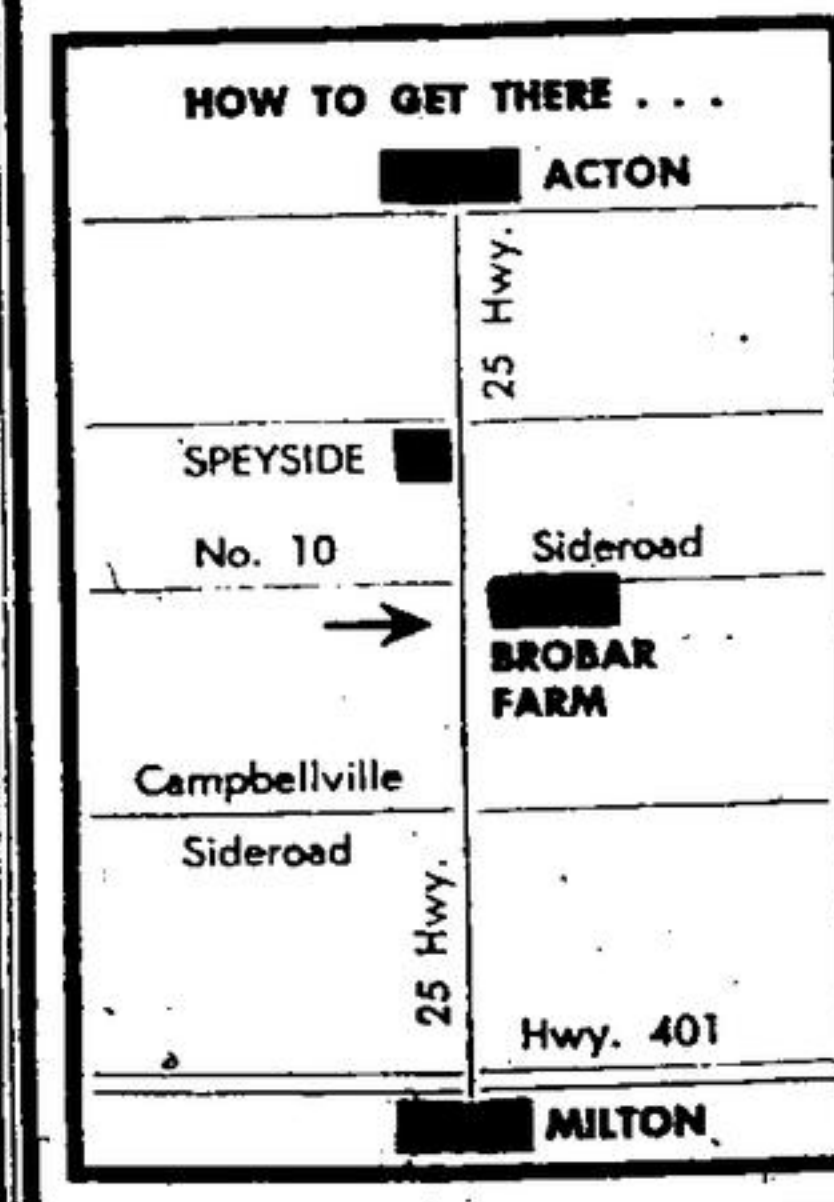
