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Forced Car Off Road Two Get Prison Terms

Two men who forced two girls off a highway near Georgetown because they refused to get out of a car with them were sentenced to two years last Tuesday.

The men, from Brampton and Streetsville, ran the car off the road to 'get even' with the girls.

Judge Allan Sprague told them "the fact that you wanted to get even with these girls over a small matter is alarming—a reaction which could easily have caused their deaths."

One of the girls, Janice Mortenson, 18, of Oakville, broke two ribs and scarred her face in the crash. She spent eleven days in hospital recovering.

The other girls were Margaret Bishop, 19, of Timmins. Her injuries were minor.

The two accused were charged with criminal negligence to Miss Mortenson.

Judge Sprague described the automobile as "a dangerous weapon, more dangerous than a knife or gun." He said "citizens of this new auto age, both old and young, will have to be made to realize this. Reports of death and tragedy on the roads by the press do not seem to be reaching the people's minds."

He said the charge of a motor vehicle casts a heavy responsibility on the driver... A responsibility toward every person on or near the road, and to ignore or abuse this responsibility is a crime against your fellow citizens."
