Regiment's Honorary Colonel Distinguished Career In Army

Present honorary colonel of the Lorne Scots Regiment is a former commanding officer of the unit.

Lt. Col. John R. Barber of Georgetown was appointed in 1963.

Col. Barber has had a long and distinguished record with the Lorne Scots.

He began his army service with the Canadian Officers Training Corps at the University of Toronto in 1924, receiving his commission as second lieutenant in 1925.

By 1931 he had won his majority with the non-permanent active militia. In June, 1940, he went on active service with the Lorne Scots, serving overseas from June, 1941, until 1947.

Col. Barber became commanding officer of the regiment in 1949 and was transferred to supplementary reserve in December, 1954.

His medals and decorations include: Defense Medal; DVSM and Clasp, War Medal 1939 to 1945; King George VI Coronation, 1937; E.D.; C.D.; Queen Elizabeth Coronation, 1953.

Col. Barber was appointed honorary lieutenant-colonel of the Lorne Scots in April, 1957.
