

Politicians Make Plans For Changes in Ridings

Officials of Halton's political parties see no great difficulty in adjusting to the new federal electoral boundary changes signed into law on Thursday.

On the federal map of constituencies, the present riding of Halton, which conforms to the boundaries of the county, will be split in two and will engulf portions of other counties on both sides.

The new ridings will be known as Halton East and Halton West.

Changes a Problem

"All changes pose problems," observed John Dewey, president of Halton County Conservative Association. "We will just divide the association into two."

The same is contemplated by the Liberals, according to Derek Mason, immediate past president of the Halton County Liberal Association. Mr. Mason spoke on behalf of president Robert Blake, who could not be reached.

"In terms of organization it will simply be a matter of splitting in half," Mr. Mason said. "I have no serious complaint."

Erin Township

Mr. Mason added that the inclusion of Erin Township north of Georgetown into Halton East may cause the problem of finding someone there to serve on the organization's executive for that riding.

President of the New Democratic Party, Murray Kernighan, said his party is organizing along the lines of the provincial ridings.

When a federal election is held the party's work will be done by the provincial structures helped by a special committee which will be set up.

"We would like to have the same number of men in the provincial house as in the federal house," Mr. Kernighan said. That way, the electoral districts would be the same for provincial or federal purposes."

Complete Review

For the new chief electoral officer, Jean-Marc Hamel, and his staff, the change in the electoral map means that Canada's 35,000 polling subdivisions must be reviewed almost name by name, street by street.

Thousands of polls have to be relocated in new ridings, like the two Haltons. Some polls contain too many voters and others too few. As a rule, urban polls group 250 to 300 eligible voters and rural polls average 150.

Nearly half the existing 283 ridings get new names along with altered boundaries. An official said the post of returning officer will fall vacant at dissolution in all ridings with new names.

Returning officers who no longer reside in their assigned constituencies also will see their tenure lapse. This includes Halton's Richard West, of Burlington.

Georgetown Jehovah's Witnesses Hear Watch Tower President

An overflow crowd of 46,118 heard Nathan H. Knorr, president of the Watch Tower Society, at the main session of the "God's Sons of Liberty" District Assembly of Jehovah's Witnesses. Mr. Melville Taylor, presiding minister of the Georgetown congregation, stated that Mr. Knorr's subject at the Toronto Exhibition Grandstand was entitled "What Has God's Kingdom been Doing since 1914?"

Speaking to delegates from eight provinces of Canada, 45 States and 14 other countries, Mr. Knorr stated, "When the Messianic kingdom of God was installed in heaven, there had to be a world-wide proclamation of that new government of the universe, for that was to be the government for doing away with all the imperfect Gentile governments of the earth and for giving the people a perfect government."

"This had to be," Knorr explained, "because Jesus the Messiah had long ago committed the Messianic kingdom of God to making such a world-wide proclamation."
