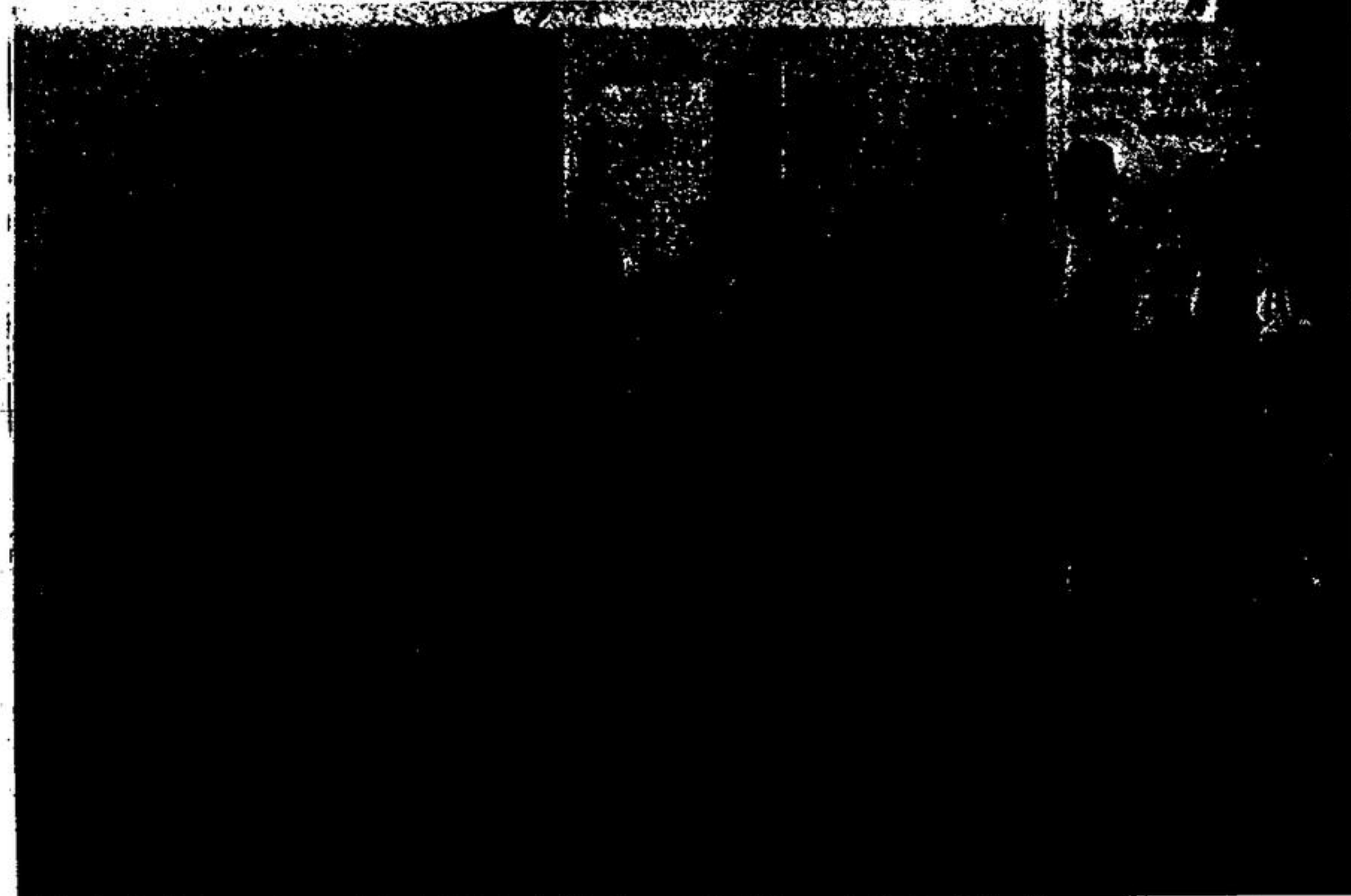
The neighbors on Churchhill Crescent, held a miscellaneous shower at the home of a former neighbour, Mrs. Ken Hulme, 10 Gower Court.

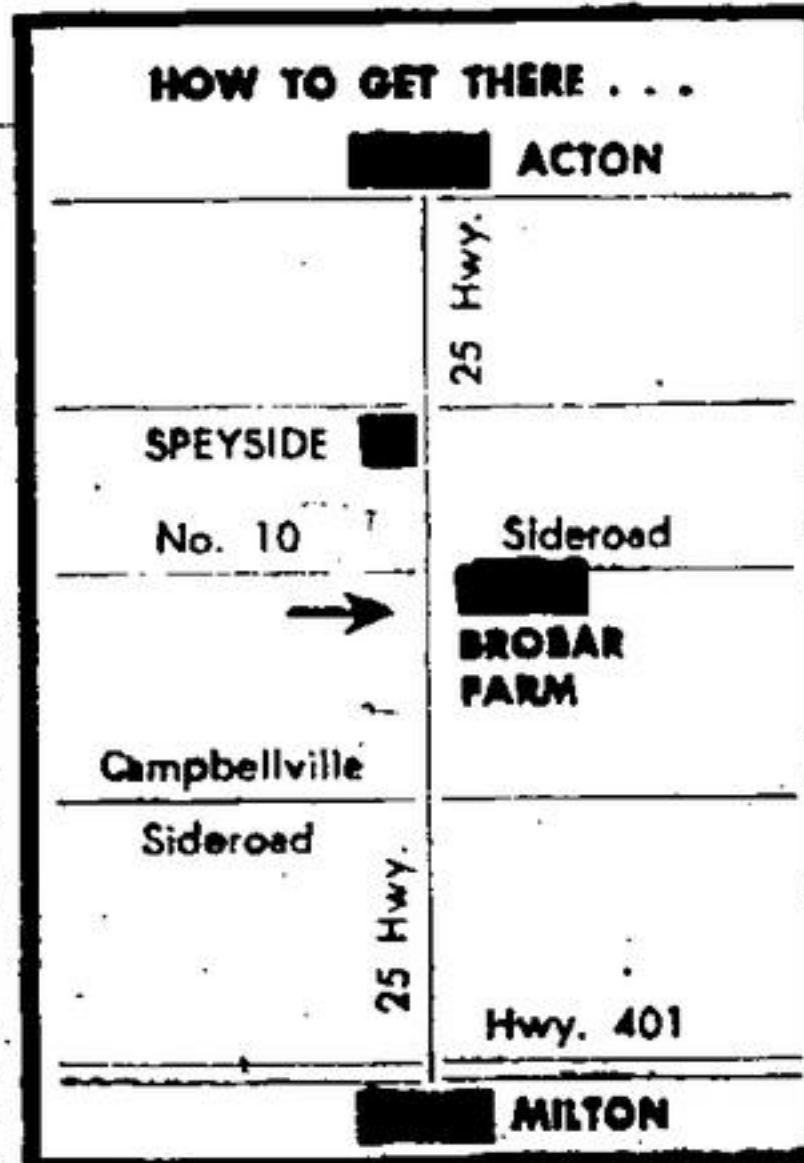
