

# Says Lack of Services Hampers Development in North Halton

Lack of services will stunt expansion in north Peel and Halton counties, municipal government expert Thomas J. Plunkett said last week.

In a progress report on his government study in the two counties, Mr. Plunkett told a gathering of Halton deputy reeves there was little chance of development in the north.

Expansion is stymied by the "terrific cost" of providing adequate waste disposal facilities, he said. Growth would continue in the lakeshore area where water and treatment plants can cope with it.

Mr. Plunkett flew in from Montreal to make the progress report on his searching inquiry into possible local government re-organization.

He said his report with its recommendations should be in the hands of Wilfred J. Spooner, minister of municipal affairs, by early September.

The local government expert left an impression with his audience that his recommendations would call for a change in the government structure of the two counties.

"The tenor of the briefs submitted to me in both counties is 'We want some kind of change,'" Mr. Plunkett pointed out.

He has received over 100 briefs - 36 during public hearings in Brampton and Milton this spring.

Of the ones received in public, only four wanted to retain the status quo, he said. Twenty favoured some kind of government re-organization. Twelve others said they would not object to a change.

"One gets the impression that the people are more or less indifferent as to the size of the municipal unit they are in as long as they have facilities, services, schools and roads," Mr. Plunkett said.

Upwards of 400 crowded into the Hays Sales Arena to watch the contest after enjoying a roast beef dinner as part of Rural-Urban Night, sponsored by the Oakville Chamber of Commerce and the Oakville Jaycees.

A special guest for the evening was pretty Ruth McKinney of Caledon, Ontario Dairy Princess for 1965-66. While Halton girls participated in a milking contest, Miss McKinney commented on her experiences as the Ontario Dairy Princess and also described the various steps being taken in the milking contest.

"June is dairy month - but every day should be Dairy Day," Miss Hunter told the large audience. "In Halton we're living in the teeth of prosperity - we have the highest per capita income of any County in Ontario and dairying is one of our major industries." She noted: "Halton is a banner county."

Halton MPP George Kerr suggested "this is one of the best methods of focussing attention on the milk industry. I'm glad to see everyone came in a car tonight," he said as he referred to the farmers' tractors protest in western Ontario concerning milk prices.
