Standards of white and pink chrysanthemums were on the altar of St. George's Anglican Church, where Rev. John H. McMullin, officiated at the double ring ceremony. Organist was George DeKleer, Georgetown, and a family friend and former Georgetown resident, Mrs. Gordon Padfield, of Waterloo, was soloist, singing the wedding Prayer before the ceremony and the Lord's Prayer during the signing of the register.

The bride, given in marriage by her father, wore a white chantilly lace over satin gown, with a fitted bodice encrusted with seed pearls, and iridescent sequins with a sweetheart neckline with lily point sleeves with a full skirt front, extending to five lace tiers at the back forming a small chapel train.
