Stiff Fines Imposed on Drag Racers

Two young men who staged a car race along the "Quarter Mile Drag Strip" at the east end of Guelph St., May 1, didn't realize they had an off-duty Barrie cop among their audience.

They ended up in court Wednesday and were each fined a total of \$128.50 or 25 days in jail as a result of the officer's evidence.

The two youths, one of Georgetown and the other of Waterdown, both pleaded not guilty to a charge of racing on the highway.

Corporal Ralph Barry of the Barrie Police Department was sitting near a window in the Delrex Restaurant having a meal with his wife and two children when he saw the incident.

He said he saw, one of the youths and his girl friend in a black Falcon speak to the other in a white Dodge. They drove off to the section of Guelph St. known to some local drivers as the "Quarter Mile Drag Strip."

Corporal Barry said the pair lined up on the highway and held up traffic while they chatted before moving off "at a great rate of speed." He said two other cars coming in the opposite direction were forced to swerve from their path.

They raced off at about 60 miles an hour and out of sight. Both cars returned to the plaza a few moments later. Georgetown police officer H. Vanderstuis stopped one of the cars which had a noisy muffler. Both men were arrested and charged with racing.

The fines were imposed by Magistrate James Black.

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Safecrack Attempt Bungled, Thieves Get \$250 in Loot

An attempt to crack a safe at the Halton Co-Op Supply Store on Guelph Street failed Thursday night but the thwarted burglars made their better worthwhile by totting off approximately \$250 in stock.

Police described the safe cracking attempt as "amateurish" because of the amount of the damage done to the unyielding vault.

Most of the stock hauled away was small tools. Item bearing series numbers will be hard for the thieves to unload, if that's their intention. A list of the serials has been teleaxed by the Georgetown Police to other departments in this part of the Province.

Entry to the Co-op building was gained through a back door which was pried open.

The robbery took place some time between 6 p.m. Thursday night when the staff left and 8

a.m. Friday morning when field man Harold Smellie discovered the damage to the safe.

Co-op manager Keith Dawson said an electric drill and a transistor radio were the most ex-

Warn Ontario Drivers New York Age Limit 18

With the summer holiday period now in full swing, the local Dept. of Transport registrar, Mrs. Beatrice Clark told The Herald that there are a number of things vacationers should keep in mind.

"Young people driving to nearby New York State should keep in mind that they must be 18 years of age to operate a motor vehicle there. Ontario residents have been charged for this offence."

The vehicle and traffic laws of that jurisdiction require that for a non-resident licence to be valid in New York, the holder must be at least 18 years old.

Therefore, the Ontario Dept. of Transport has asked all offices to issue this warning to all 18 and 17 year old drivers . . . the vehicle and traffic laws of New York State require that for a non-resident licence to be valid in the state, the holder must have at least reached his 18th birthday.

In some cases, special licences are issued to New York state resident drivers under 18—but non-resident licence holders . . . and that includes Ontario drivers . . . must be 18 years of age to drive legally in New York.

So take a tip—if you're not 18 don't drive in New York . . . they rigorously enforce this law!

The other tip is for European travellers who intend to do a bit of driving while abroad.

Canadians planning to travel abroad may now obtain International Driving Permits, the Ontario Dept. of Transport announced today.

Canadian Automobile Ass'n. and through it the affiliated Ontario Motor League Clubs, as the issuing authority for I.D.P.'s in Ontario. They will be recognized in 177 different countries.

Fee for the permits, issuable to any holder of a valid driving licence, is \$3.00.

A spokesman for the Dept. urged all Ontario residents to obtain I.D.P.'s before leaving Canada.

Issuance of the permits has been made possible by the 1949 United Nations Convention on Road Traffic agreed to by all of the Canadian Provinces.

Under its terms, Canadians travelling overseas will now share the same reciprocity with respect to licences in international traffic as do the residents of the 77 other signatory nations.

A statement issued by the C.A.A. noted that Canadian driving licences are already recognized in many Western European countries. However, with out an International Driving Permit there are often embarrassments and misunderstandings for motorists contacting local authorities who have no understanding of English.

International Driving Permits are printed in 10 languages, including the five official languages of the United Nations—English, French, Spanish, Russian and Chinese.

Motor vehicle operators in the district are reminded that during July and August the office of the Dept. of Transport at 41 Main Street South is closed all days Saturday. It will start remaining open again on Saturday, Sept. 10th, after Labor Day.
