Park Resigns as Kelso

Swimming Instructor

George Park, former Olympic swimming champion, has quit as swimming instructor at Kelso Conservation Area Pool at this north Halton 400-acre summer playground.

Mr. Park's resignation comes after only a few weeks at the pool. It is understood that he wants to devote more time furthering his swimming career.

The Conservation Authority now has 15 lifeguards and instructors — nine of them full time. They are supervised by Jim Grolikowski of Milton Heights — one of the highest qualified lifeguards in Canada.

About 3,000 people visited the park area during the three-day holiday weekend.

Meanwhile about 200 people have signed on for swimming lessons at the pool. In charge is Peggy Fitzpatrick, head instructor.

Melanson's Doubles Spark Milton Win Over Georgetown

Veteran third sacker Art Melanson drove in three runs with a pair of doubles to spark Milton's 7-5 victory over Georgetown Giants in a Halton County League game here Wednesday.

The win snapped last place Milton's losing streak at four games and dropped the Giants to sixth place, half a game behind the Oakville Oaks.

Key blow in the victory was a 2-out triple by Al Jordan that tied Ron Naylor from first base with the winning run in the top of the seventh.

Milton had grabbed a 4-0 lead in the first inning, then squandered it away and Georgetown went in front 5-4 with two runs in the sixth, before the top of Milton's batting order came through with three runs in the seventh.

Little Milton relief pitcher, Don Boughton's fine defensive play in the final four innings was a major factor in the victory he gained credit for.

All four runs scored off Boughton were unearned. The manager was involved in nine 1B putouts by the Red Sox, but he took over from starter Steve Aselton.

Giant hurler Bernie Dore was proudly off his best form in the first inning when the Red Sox got to him for four of their ten runs. The veteran's pregame warmup was interrupted by a fifteen minute rain and he was out on almost cold.

Melanson, with his two doubles and catcher Doug McCutcheon, with a single and a triple, the Milton attack. Catcher Earl Lindsay and outfielder Earl had two hits each for Georgetown.

Georgetown sliced the Milton lead to one run in the fourth on singles by first sacker Bob Bratton and catcher Don Lindsay, a walk and an error by Scisizzi. The inning ended when Dennis

Dore walked and scored the go ahead run when Rasberry couldn't get under a fly by Arbic. Arbic went to third before Rasberry could get the ball to the infield but the inning ended when Gibbons grounded out.

A pair of infield outs started Milton's seventh. McCutcheon tripled and scored when Arbic fielded a routine grounder by Naylor and fired it over the head of first sacker James.

Jordan's triple won the game and Melanson drove in the insurance run with a double.

Jim Willmott picked up the win for Hornby, fanning 13 batters and giving up four hits. Clint Jones pitched the first four innings for Procor striking out six and allowing five hits, he was relieved by Leo Maracle who gave up two hits and struck out seven batters.

Graham Gillies went two for four in the hitting department for Hornby, including a solo home run in the seventh inning. Blake Inglis had two singles with John Cunningham, John Willmott and Lou Bertasson picking up singles.

Joe Auger had two hits for Procor with singles going to Phil Alcumbrack and Rene Bouchard.
