Holds Red Sox to 3 Hits Westbrook Giants Win

Georgetown Giants lashed Mike Boughton for 13 hits, 6 of them in the last-inning to hand Milton Red Sox a 7-4 setback in the county town Monday night.

Don Westbrook handcuffed the Mills on just 3 hits in the five inning encounter and furthered the campaign with a 5th inning double that pushed over an insurance run.

He struck out 12 frustrated Sox in the abbreviated affair, and allowed 6 to reach base via the walk route.

Giants hit Boughton in every frame. They slapped one hit off him in the 1st, three in the 2nd, one in the 3rd, two more in the 4th and six in the 5th.

McCristal came the rest of the way on Westbrook's two-bagger, and Westbrook went to third on Arbie's third hit of the ball game, and scored on Tom James' lined shot.
