### June Occupancy Rate Is High at Hospital

Georgetown and District Memorial Hospital was unusually busy during June, statistics on the operation of the hospital last month which have just been released revealed.

The percentage of occupancy for last month averaged 81.9 per cent compared to 66.9 per cent in June of last year. The 1968 figure is closer to normal since there is less illness during the summer months and vacation plans influence many people to schedule required operations for another time of year.

It is already indicated that the figures for July will be considerably lower.

"We expect to have one or two empty patient rooms which will be a good opportunity for plumbers to complete the installation of piped oxygen to all patients' rooms in the medical and surgical wards and the emergency department which do not at present have it," hospital administrator Fred Whittaker told The Herald.

"This will be a tremendous improvement and offer greater convenience to both patients and staff as it will make it no longer necessary to wheel heavy oxygen cylinders to these rooms as is required at present," he said.

It will also not be necessary to store so many cylinders as the oxygen will be piped from a large built-in tank. The piped oxygen is made possible through a donation earlier this year for this purpose from Varian Associates of Canada Ltd.

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### North Halton Accident Toll is Down from '65

The North Halton detachment of the OPP reports 37 accidents in the North Halton area during the month of June, resulting in 16 injuries and \$10,060 property damage.

This brings the total for the

first half of 1968, to 243 accidents with four fatalities, 86 injuries and \$141,420 property damage.

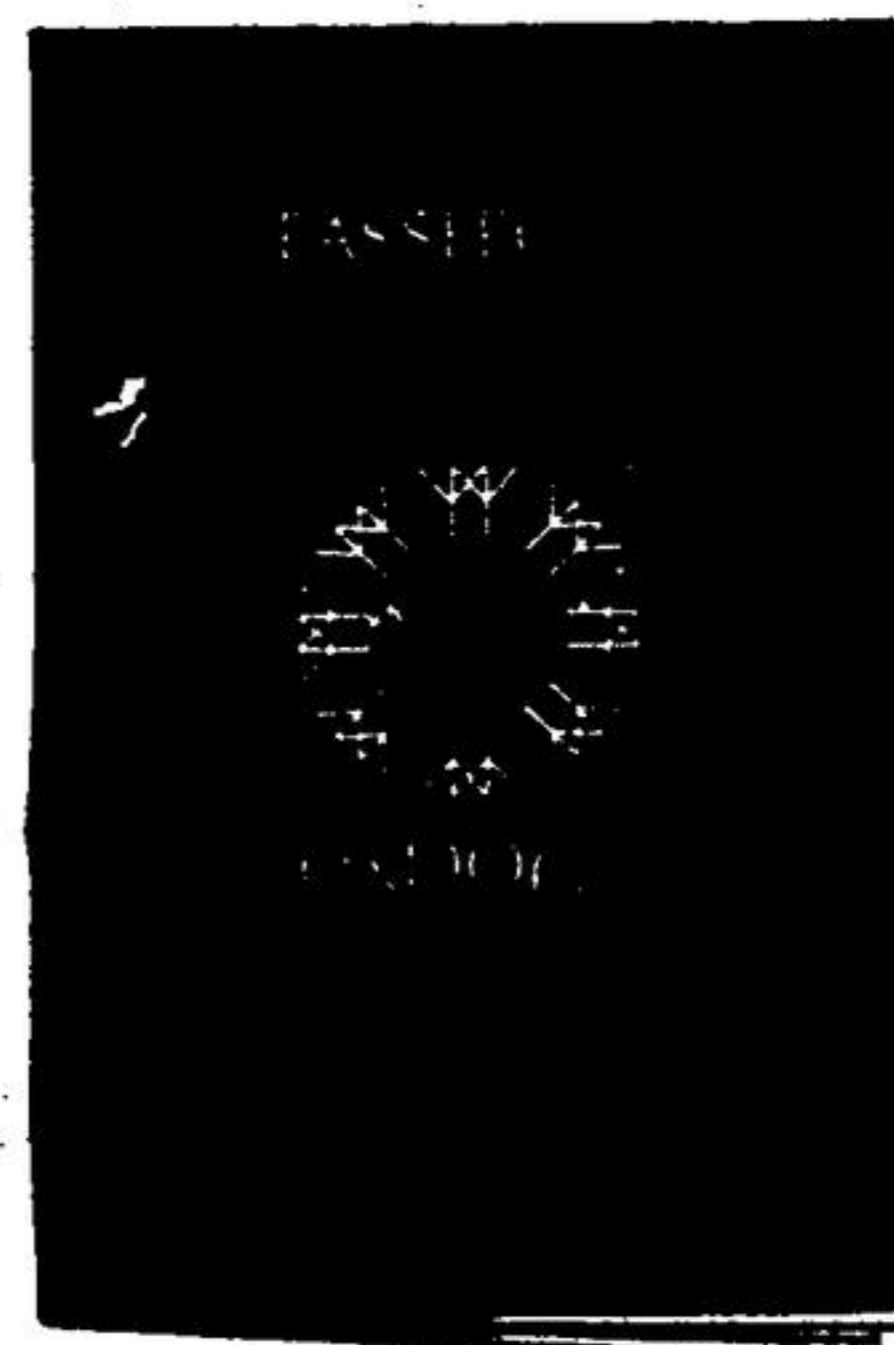
