Dismissed at Lengthy Hearing occupied about two hours in Thursday's magistrate's court a Hornby man won an acquittal on a charge of causing an injury to 16-year-old Kenneth Rusk by discharging a shotgun

at a motor vehicle on June 18th. He had elected trial by a judge

Charge of Shooting at Car

in a higher court. Rusk, who lives in the Hornby area near the accused, said that at about 1.50 a.m. on June 18th he and Victor Jakaitis, a neighbor, had started out in the latter's car to look for their brothers, who had gone to a ball game in Omagh the previous evening and who had not returned home. They were proceeding up the Eighth Line and drove nto the driveway of a brother of the accused who lives nearby in order to turn around. They then noticed him standing in the road with a gun. He had just stopped another car driven by Rusk's father, the witness said

"He stopped us and told us to identify ourselves," Rusk told the court. "I was getting ready to get out of the car. Jakaitis started it. The accused shot. The door was open. I felt something hit the side of my hand. I looked and there was blood coming out. I got out and walked back to where he was. He was standing there telling his wife to phone the police."

Rusk said that previous to being ordered to stop, he and Jakaitis had been shining a flashlight on the roadside ditch in order to see if their brothers were hiding there.

Jakaitis said the pellets from the shotgun had done about \$50 worth of damage to the car's upholstery.

Constable Dennis Kaye, who investigated the incident, sai the gun was unloaded when he examined it, and he found an empty shotgun shell by the side of the road. He said the skin of Rusk's right hand was ripped and bleeding. 
