WARNING

CHILDREN AND MATCHES

It has come to the attention of the Georgetown Fire Department that an unusually large number of young children, under 10 years of age, have been purchasing and carrying with them penny books of matches. With the present dry spell the Department feels that the combination of youngsters and matches constitute a serious fire threat at this time and suggests to parents that they do their umost to kep the two apart. To local storekeepers, the Department suggests that very small children buying matches be asked to produce a note from home saying that they are on an errand.

The indiscriminate use of book matches by children is believed to have been the cause of three minor fires last week which could have been major blazes had they. not been discovered in good time.
