## Squeeze Bunt Helps Juvies Win From Oakville 6 - 3

Georgetown Juvenile Merchants resorted to some solid baseball tactics with the use of the squeeze bunt, and handled the Oakville Mets easily, defeating the lakeside crew 6-3 here on Thursday night.

Pitcher Mike Tost started for the local crew. He allowed six hits, but was firing the ball in good form. With himself under control, the ball reacted the same way and he struck out 14 batters in seven innings while scattering the six hits.

Ahead Early Georgetown went ahead in the first inning on a walk to Riddall, who stole second and moved to third on a wild pitch. Peavoy singled and drove Riddall home. The score stayed 1-0 until the 4th inning when Tost gave Scarrow of Oakville a walk and he scored on Neil's triple. With two out, the next batter popped up to end the inning.

With the score tied 1-1, Arbic drew a walk in the 4th, he stole second and third. On the attempted squeeze play, the Oakville pitcher seeing the Georgetown runner streaking for home, attempted to pitch the ball down on the batter Mike Tost, and in doing so the Oakville catcher could not control the ball and the run scored. Oakville removed the pitcher Naughton in favour of Delegrade who hails from Burlington and he retired the side.

With the game so tight Georgetown

opened their half of the fifth with a single by Riddall. He moved to third on a single by Peavoy and Peavoy in turn stole second. Lane struck out and with men on second and third and with Arbic at bat, the Oakville crew moved their infield back. Manager Richmond seized the opportunity to cross up the visitors by calling the squeeze. Arbic put the ball down the first base line. As the first baseman and pitcher came in to field the ball, the

second baseman was slow in covering the base and missed the throw, leaving Arbic safe. Oakville was slow in retrieving the ball and Arbic advanced to first on some fine base running, pushing Riddall and Peavoy across the plate ahead of him. Arbic scored when Marzo grounded to shortstop and the ball was bobbled. The local crew added one more run in the sixth when Riddall singled, stole second and was scored on Peavoy's double.
