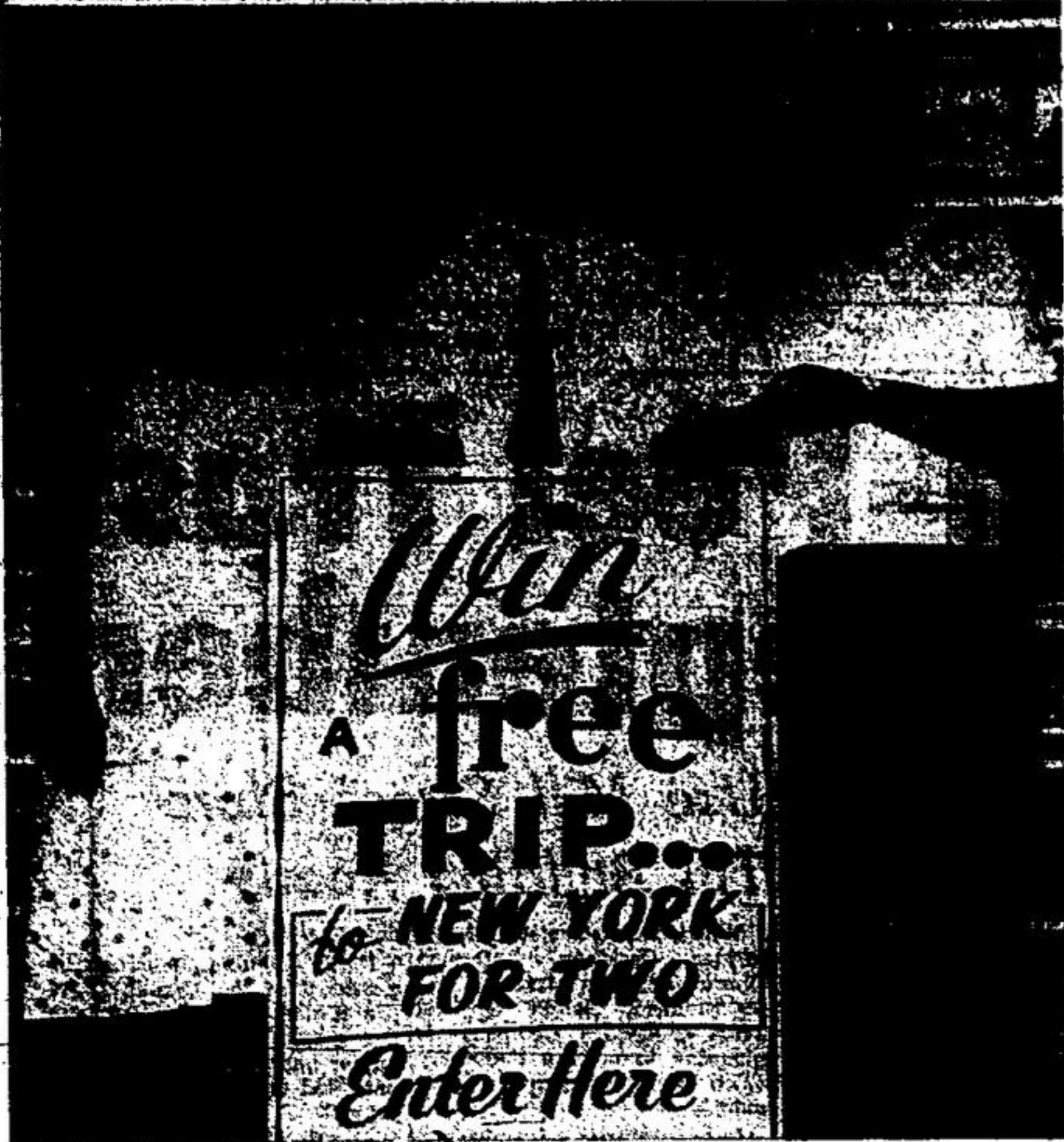

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### Beauty Salon Introduces New Colour Technique

A remarkable advancement in hair fashion technique is announced this week by Christell's Hair Styling.

The long expected delivery of a new piece of equipment was made Friday afternoon and set into operation that evening in a demonstration of the fastest hair colouring methods known. Christell's has obtained one of the first of the very few in Canada.

As proprietor John Olivier explains, the biggest problem with present bleaching and tinting methods is the excessive time involved. With the new equipment, the "Rilling Acceleromatic" time is cut to one-tenth. In other words, tinting now takes three minutes instead of thirty. A five hour bleach is cut to half an hour—and done in one application.

A by-product is that the hair is left in a more normal condition instead of the usual dryness; since chemicals are not on the hair as long. The change is said to be as revolutionary as when cold waves were introduced to supercede the old "wired up" permanent waving. Present colours and shades remain the same, however.

Women using the innovation experience only a pleasant sen-

sation of slight warmth for the short period.

Mr. Olivier says that this will be a boon to women who have never before been able to colour their hair because they could not afford the time or had scalps too sensitive to long processing.

### Area Pollen Count High, Inspector Asks Ragweed Eradication

The cough and wheeze signalling the thin edge of the annual hay fever wedge is beginning to be heard in the dreaded season of the running nose and red eyes makes its return.

Hay fever sufferers have a hard time of it in the Georgetown area, states County Weed Inspector V. E. MacArthur.

Mr. MacArthur says that the pollen count in this area is comparatively high. The pollen which causes the irritation comes mainly from the ragweed.

The weed inspector urges the farmer to destroy the weed as effectively as possible.

He recommends chemical sprays, but says pulling or mowing helps.
