

Agree or Build Own Jail Peel Jury Recommends

Peel County Grand Jury today told Peel County to build a new jail on its own if it can not immediately agree to plans for a regional jail.

"It is now mandatory to erect a new jail of your own. If you cannot get an agreement with another county to build a joint structure you must go ahead at once on your own," the jury's report read.

PEEL — HALTON

Peel and Halton County Councils are now in negotiation to build a regional jail, but discussion between counties concerning procedures has slowed progress.

"This is the fourth time we have reported on the seriousness of the situation," said the jury, "and looking at the jail recently it is obvious that all previous jury reports have been completely ignored."

GRAND JURY

The grand jury noted that the present building is totally inadequate, and that lack of

facilities for the solitary confinement of prisoners is making the work of the jail itself extremely difficult. Trouble some prisoners often disturb the routine of the whole institution, it points out.

The jury urged the provision of psychiatric services for the prisoners. It reported that five members of the staff resigned in March because of low salaries.

Last January the grand jury said that unless a new jail was provided in accordance with its suggestions, the jury's entire function was superfluous.

HALTON STALLS

Although the Regional Jail has been approved in general by Peel County, Halton committee members may want to make some changes in the proposed agreement.

So far the two negotiating committees have not met to discuss the problem. "We have found that we could make better progress meeting separately," Halton committee chairman Gordon Gallagher said this week.

LOCATION

He added: "We have indicated that we would prefer to have the jail located within reasonable distance between Peel and Milton Courts — somewhere south of Highway 401."

Mr. Gallagher said he did not think it possible that the jail could be established north of the freeway.

But the site cannot yet be officially agreed upon. The decision will have to wait until the five-man governing body for the new jail is set up. They will decide where it will be.

GENERAL APPROVAL

"The Minister has approved the agreement in general," Mr. Gallagher said. "But I would think it would be around Sept."

The district governor conferred with Robert Gougeon, local Rotary club president, and Ralph Ursel, club secretary, on matters of club administration and plans for future service activities.

Referring to the program of Richard L. Evans of Salt Lake City, Utah, president of Rotary International for 1966-67, the district governor said, "President Evans has urged Rotarians everywhere to be concerned with youth, employment and education, health, safety, and respect for law as a broad community action program, and to acquire friendships and personal contacts in many parts of the world for the development of international points of view in general and the exchange of youth across national boundaries in particular."

The Oakville Labor Council has recently donated \$100 to the campaign of the O.F.L. for the purpose of ending injunctions at peaceful strikes.

A goal of over half a million dollars has been set up by the labor federation to be spent in fighting the injunction laws.

During his visit the Rotary official was given additional information on some of the local Rotary club's activities, including the Senior Citizen's Christmas Dinner, and Crippled Children work.

He said over 25,000 people in Oakville are directly or indirectly connected with unions and that attendance at the rally could be considerably more than the 11,000 membership of the labor council with its 32 affiliated local unions.

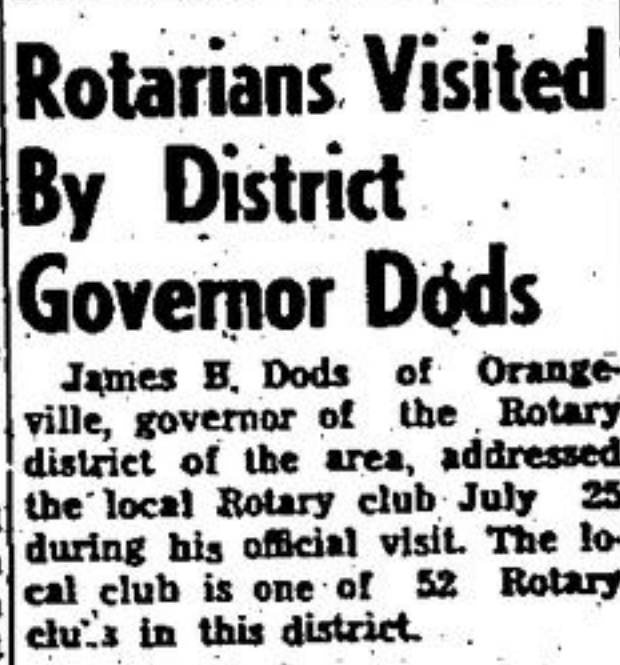

Speaking of the global growth of Rotary, he said, "Rotary is the pioneer of the service clubs and today numbers more than 12,400 clubs with a combined membership of nearly 600,000 business and professional men. Spread throughout 133 countries in all parts of the world, Rotary clubs meet every day of the week and conduct activities to improve their communities, aid youth, elevate business standards, and further international friendship and understanding."

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 - **OPERATE TRACTORS SAFELY:** Start tractors smoothly, turn corners slowly. Avoid ditches, banks and soft ground. Always hitch to the drawbar.
 - **USE THE RIGHT TOOLS FOR THE JOB:** Make sure your tools are in good safe condition. Keep them in a safe place and handle with care.
 - **WATCH YOUR STEP TO PREVENT FALLS:** Keep ladders and steps in good repair, with no loose rungs. Make sure they are easily accessible in case of emergency, and don't pile things on stairways.
 - **SPEAK TO ANIMALS WHEN APPROACHING THEM:** Keep them calm by acting with calm self assurance yourself. Keep bulls in a safe pen.
 - **BE A GOOD HOUSEKEEPER:** Have a place for everything and keep everything in its place.
 - **BE "FIRESIGHTED"** Don't smoke around the barn. Pour gasoline outdoors to prevent the accumulation of explosive vapours. Dry clean outdoors. Don't use kerosene to start fires. Be careful with matches.
 - **APPLY FIRST AID PROMPTLY:** Even minor injuries may be dangerous if they are not treated immediately. Keep first aid kits in the house, in the barn and on the tractor.
 - **TREAT ALL GUNS AS IF THEY WERE LOADED:** Keep guns unloaded except when actually using them. Aim ONLY at targets you want to shoot.
 - **KNOW AND OBEY ALL TRAFFIC LAWS:** Follow safe driving practices. Obey all traffic signs.
