Adamson Developing New Golf Course South of Huttonville

Harvey Adamson, who for six years supervised and managed the now well-established Georgetown Golf & Country Club, R. R. 4, Georgetown, has turned his efforts to shaping a new course just off the 4th Line, Chinguacousy, south of Huttonville.

The new course, strictly for pay-as-you-play golfers, will take five years to complete, but by the spring of 1967 it will be ready in its first stage for golfers.

The original idea, to provide residents of that area with as perfect as possible a pay-as-you-play course for both beginner and expert has now become a million dollar project.

The course site is located just south of Steeles Ave. with the entrance off the 4th Line. It will cover 125 acres in 6,600 yards of actual playing surface.

Most of the 45 shareholders involved come from the area in which the course is located and range from lawyers to school-teachers and company directors. All have one thing in common — they believe the new course will fill a crying need.

Evidence of the enthusiasm and interest is that the entire capital required was subscribed in less than two months.

Arrangements have been made for a constant water supply from the Credit River — just 650 feet from the course. And it will be carried to every corner of the green turf by more than three miles of underground piping.

The par 72 course will have a 575 yard par five as its longest hole to test the big hitters. In addition to the playing area there will be a practice driving range, and putting green, and other "frill" facilities such as a luxury clubhouse will come later.

The planner, Harvey Adamson, will be director and general manager.

No Supervision at Quarry Warn Swimmers of Danger

The chairman of the Water Safety Committee of the Georgetown Branch of the Canadian Red Cross Society expressed concern this week over the number of swimming areas in the Georgetown vicinity which lack supervision.

"An abandoned quarry on the 6th Line of Esqueping in the Limehouse area is the most likely place for a water tragedy to occur right now," Mrs. Connie Nieuwhof told The Herald this week.

She said children have been telling their parents that they are off to swim in the Georgetown Community Pool, but instead have been going to the dangerous quarry site.

On open weekends the road near the quarry is lined, with cars even though the property owner has posted no trespassing signs, she said.

Mrs. Nieuwhof also named four recreation areas in the immediate vicinity which offer swimming facilities but no lifeguard. She said the Red Cross branch is doing what it can to change these situations.

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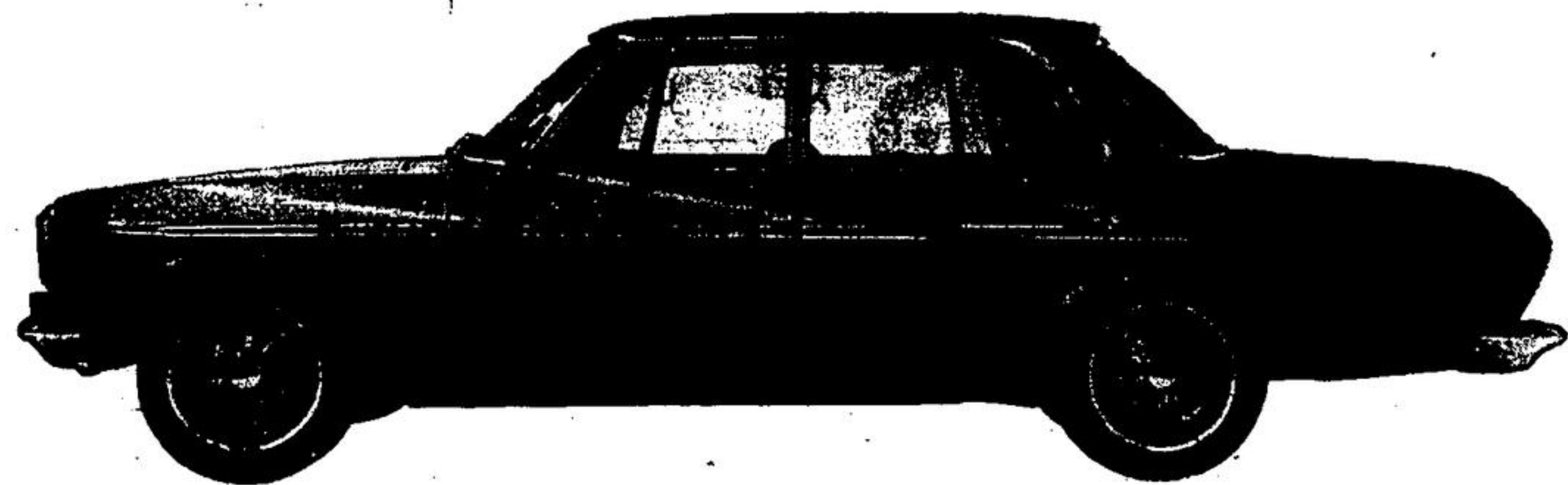
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
