### Citizens' Group Would Paint Posts for Safety

A complaint and an offer of help were given to Council Monday night by a Main St. south resident, Bill Campsey.

"I didn't come here to make a political issue, only to try to have my road and sidewalk fixed," said Mr. Campsey. He told of the rain on Sunday running along the sidewalk and down his driveway.

The offer of help came when Mr. Campsey suggested that the town provide the paint and a group of citizens would paint the posts at Normandy Blvd. and on Main St. South, near Berrick Hall. "There is scarcely any black and white left on them," he added.

Concluding he charged that Cr. Hyde had stated at last week's meeting that some of the homes on Main St. South were not up to standard. "Which ones?" he demanded. "I said it doesn't come up to commercial standard, for which the area is zoned," replied Cr. Hyde. "A man's home

is his castle as far as I'm concerned, and none of my business."

Cr. Hyde predicted the houses would be torn down in that area someday, and the business area continued down to Park Avenue.

Reeve W. Hunter said the sidewalks would be discussed after the auditor's statement is received. "As far as the paint is concerned, tell us how much you need and we'll go along," he added.

"You mean to tell me I'll accept this offer from ratepayers for the few dollars involved," queried the mayor.

Cr. Speight commended Mr. Campsey for his generous offer, but felt as a matter of safety, which the posts are, town men should be used.

Taking the opposite view, Cr. Hyde claimed that if the citizens were interested and willing they should be allowed to do it.

Cr. Harrison doubted "we motives somewhat," saying, "Mr. Campsey was really saying if the town is too poor to do a little job like this we'll do it ourselves."

"We thank you anyway, but I think the town should do it," said Cr. Harrison to Mr. Campsey.

The matter was left like that.

### Minister Commends Farm Safety Week

As part of the effort to reduce farm accidents, the observance of Farm Safety Week sponsored by the Farm Safety Council of Ontario — July 24 to 30th, was commended by the Honourable Wm. A. Stewart, Minister of Agriculture and Food.

"As a result of the Ontario Department of Agriculture and Food's Farm Accident Survey in 1959-60, and the partial surveys undertaken by ten counties during the past three years, it is evident that there are far too many accidents on the farm today," Mr. Stewart pointed out. "Therefore, County and District Farm Safety Councils have been organized to work in co-operation with the Farm Safety Council of Ontario and the Department of Agriculture and Food. Their work is reflected in the reduction of the number of accidents and human as well as financial losses. However, this reduction is still not sufficient and we must all endeavor to increase our efforts toward making the farm a safer place to live."

Accident prevention must become an integral part of farm management since the costs involved in accidents are considerable. Accidents have a considerable effect on the farm family, bearing on the health, and as well as on income by the savings in property loss.
