

King Street Resident Irked Wants Mill Odor Stopped

A King Street resident, Harry Hayward, told council Tuesday night that the odour from a paper mill is becoming unbearable. He contended that a little pressure from council might result in better control. "I know it can't be stopped, but it could be controlled better. We are taxed just the same as those in sweet smelling district," he added.

He also complained of the condition of King Street, where he claimed nothing had been done for years.

Reeve Hunter pointed out that a motion to have storm sewerage done on King St. had been passed at the last road

committee meeting. However, he had been asked to withhold it until a committee at which the auditor would be present.

Mayor Gibbons assured Mr. Hayward he would contact Domtar immediately, bringing to their attention the fact that the odour was again becoming objectionable.

Cr. Harrison pointed out that any hold up on road work on King St. was not unhelpful. "We have to get approval from the Department of Highways, otherwise we get no subsidy on it."

Reeve Hunter added that Mr. Carr who had been doing

the plans and specifications for it was "just swamped with work at the time," and had not submitted, or had not received Department of Highways approval. He added that the new town engineer had just started and would take a little time to get adjusted.

Cr. Hyde explained it would be held up until the finances were straightened up, since they had not received all the money due them from the Department for work done in 1964 and 1965.

Cr. Speight suggested that the clerk write the Dams and Smith engineering firm and see if they could help clear it up.

The matter will be taken up with the auditor at the next committee meeting.

Discontinue Heavy Horses, Poultry, Swine at Fall Fair

The Georgetown Fair Board made what to some may be world shaking decisions, but lack of interest in some classes has given way to new and more active features.

With no competition in the heavy horse classes the past few years the board decided to spend this prize money in different directions. However, a couple of local horse breeders will be asked to put on a driving exhibition in front of the grandstand in lieu of competi-

tion.

The poultry lawn show came in for the same fate when it was dropped due to lack of interest on the part of poultrymen and fair directors alike. Another deterrent is the lack of proper facilities for showing the birds and pet stock.

No competition in the swine classes also eliminated them, but additional prize money was added to the sheep, cattle, horse, and vegetable show.
