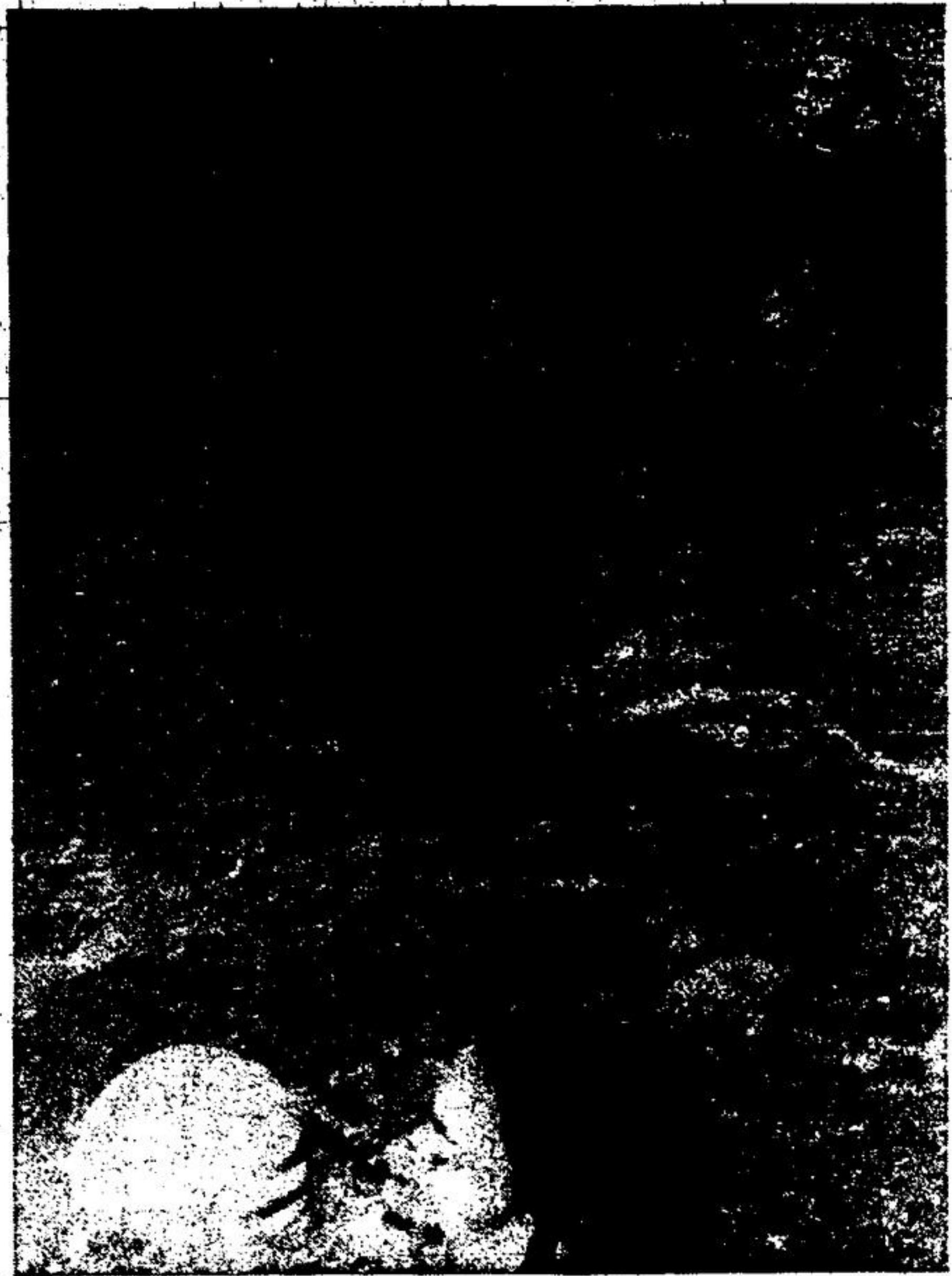

The Co-ed Club of the Georgetown and District YMCA will sponsor the "Motorcycle Safety Week" from August 22 to 27th inclusive at the Delrex Market Centre on Guelph St.

Mr. and Mrs. William White of the Canadian Motorcycle Association have guided the Georgetown Co-eds in laying out the course of instruction in motorcycle highway safety. John Mileham and other
