Don't Second Guess; Principal Advises Parents Of Beginners

"Don't try to second guess the kindergarten teacher." That was the advice of Hazel Allen, principal of George Kennedy Public School when asked by The Herald for some advice to parents of children who will be starting school for the first time this September.

"Some parents make the mistake of trying to guess what type of work their child will be receiving in K.P. and go to a lot of preparation which works to no advantage," Mr. Allen told The Herald. "The child least prepared for formal school work is often the first to adjust to the kindergarten routine," he said.

Mr. Allen said the parents can help prepare their child for the first school year by letting

the youngster develop a degree of self-sufficiency. He said children who are accustomed to being under the supervision of someone other than their parent, for example a Sunday school teacher or nursery school teacher, will make a smoother transition to school life.

"But it is sometimes harmful for the parents to assume that a certain thing will be taught. For instance, some parents instruct their children in the alphabet thinking it will be taught in kindergarten, but it is not. And counting ability is also of no advantage for the beginner," he said.

A child who arrives in kindergarten from a home with a good social atmosphere, and who is used to getting along with

others in his own age group will have the easiest time adjusting, he said.
