He usually emphasizes the teaching ministry, and so he should. However, in an evangelistic crusade such as the Halton-Peel venture, full orbed evangelistic preaching comes into its own.
First, there is the vast crowd. Evangelistic preaching is best associated with great throngs of people. There is something vibrant and living about a crowd of people that gives evangelistic preaching an importance which heightens as the attendance grows. Geared to the conversion of men, Mr. Moore's kind of preaching is directed for a verdict. Thus the larger the crowd, the greater the importance of each spoken word as multitudes may be making their decision for Christ that very night. Every great evangelist has drawn large crowds and Barry Moore is no exception. Everywhere he goes, thousands have attended.
Then, there is the atmosphere of expectancy. You can sense it the moment you enter any great crusade. People expect things to happen and they do happen. Before they have even arrived, there is the pulse beat of knowing that many inquirers will be responding when the invitation is given at the end of the message.
Thirdly, there is the preaching itself. Terse, pointed, graphic dynamic preaching that arrests the attention of every person present. There is a touch of the dramatic; a holy hush has descended over the vast throng of people in the auditorium. The penetrating voice of the evangelist rings with the prophetic. Conviction begins to grip the heart of the indifferent. Suddenly, there is an awareness that God is real. Eternal issues have displaced

the material demands of earth. Eternal issues are at stake; God and man have confronted each other. In the words of the Bible, the simple Gospel message has become "the power of God unto salvation to every one that believeth."

The evening ends with the great choir singing a hymn of invitation. A breathtaking pause follows and as we have so often wondered when we've attended similar crusades, "Will they come; will they respond? But they do." First a few and then others, making their way out of their seat and streaming down the aisles, they stand at the front around the evangelist. They come to surrender their lives to Christ or to rededicate themselves to a new and vital Christian witness.

Who can describe the thrill of seeing such things as these, I shall never cease to be deeply moved every time I witness it.

This September 18 to 25 gives us all, the opportunity to witness these things as we pray and look forward to the Halton-Peel Crusade this fall with the Evangelist Barry Moore.

Childbirth Preparation Class Is Scheduled by Health Unit

The first of three series of classes in preparation for childbirth and expectant parenthood will commence September 15 in Georgetown it was revealed this week by the Halton County Health Unit.

The upcoming series will include nine classes and will run until November 10. Other series are planned for Feb. 9 to April 6, and April 20 to June 15.

Miss Grace Levey, Halton County Health Unit director of nursing, told The Herald that the classes will be held in Knox Presbyterian Church hall with Mrs. Anne French instructing.

Although geared primarily to the mothers, two of the classes will be for fathers as well, the second, which deals with growth of the baby, and the last dealing with the family as a whole. In addition, expectant mothers taking the course receive mimeographed copies at each lecture for their husband's examination.

"We have been very pleased with the response of the fathers who have displayed a great interest in the course. Their interest has added tremendous strength to the response as a whole," said Miss Levey.

Films and other visual aids

regarding nutrition are used in the classes. Lecture plus class participation keynotes the teaching method and half the class time is often devoted to physical preparation such as body relation exercises or "techniques" as the Health Unit prefers to call them.

All prospective participants in the course must be referred by their family doctor, Miss Levey pointed out.

Also involved in the course is a tour through the Georgetown and District Memorial Hospital which tends to lessen the apprehension some women tend to feel about hospital. Miss Levey pointed out that many go to the hospital for the first time when they are having a baby. An obstetrics department supervisor will conduct the tour.

A fee of \$2 is charged for the series of classes, however this will be increased to \$5 when the February classes commence. Miss Levey said the fee covers the hall rental and the cost of literature.

The course is followed-up later when the public health nurses visit the mothers after their babies are born. The course is actually the first step in the over-all family section of the Halton County Health Unit.

Beginning with the birth of the first child the Unit aspires to educating the family up to and including the school age of all their children Miss Levey said.

Research Council Act Amendments
To change the title and specific terms of this Act.

Aeronautics Act Amendment
To regulate the use of aeronautical services and facilities provided by the Minister of Transport.

Bankruptcy Act Amendment
An amendment to correct abuses of the bankruptcy process and the administration of small estates and to make special provision for the orderly payment of debts.

Canada - U.K. and Certain Other Tax Agreements Implemented
To avoid double taxation on certain classes of income and to implement conventions with certain other countries.

Fair Wages and Hours of Labour Act
To ensure that firms contracting with the Government honor the regulations of the Canada Labour Code.

Training Allowances Act
Increases allowances to persons being trained under technical and vocational training programmes.

Northwest Territories Act Amendment
Increase in local self-government.

Yukon Act Amendment
Increase in local self-government.

Government Organization Act
Re-organizes structure of federal ministries with major changes in six government departments.

National Arts Centre Act
Providing for the establishment of a cultural centre in the nation's capital.

Public Utilities Tax Transfer Act
Transferred to the Provinces the bulk of income taxes on certain types of utility companies.

Dock Workers Legislation
To implement settlement by collective bargaining of dock workers' strike at Montreal, Quebec and Trois-Rivieres.

Statute Law (Superannuation) Amendment Act
To bring the Federal Government Superannuation Plans into line with the Canada Pension Plan.

An Act To Amend the Canadian Corporation for the 1967 World Exhibition Act
To provide for increased copyright protection for the EXPO symbols.

Public Service Staff Relations, Public Service Employment Act and An Act to Amend the Financial Administration Act
Legislation designed to secure collective bargaining for Federal Civil Servants. (There are three Bills now being studied by a Joint Senate-Commons Committee on the Public Service.)

Electoral Boundaries Readjustment Act Amendment
An extension of the period of Parliamentary consideration of the new boundaries.

An Act to Amend the Bretton Woods Agreement Act
To authorize an increase to the International Monetary Fund and the International Bank for Reconstruction and Development.

Other Bills have been passed but I have not listed each one, only those of major interest to our area.

In addition several pieces of major legislation have been introduced for further debate in the Fall in the House of Commons. These are:

Medicare

To provide for a substantial contribution by the Government of Canada to Provinces which bring in prepaid medical insurance and which offers comprehensive coverage to all the population. This is transferable from Province to Province and is publicly administered.

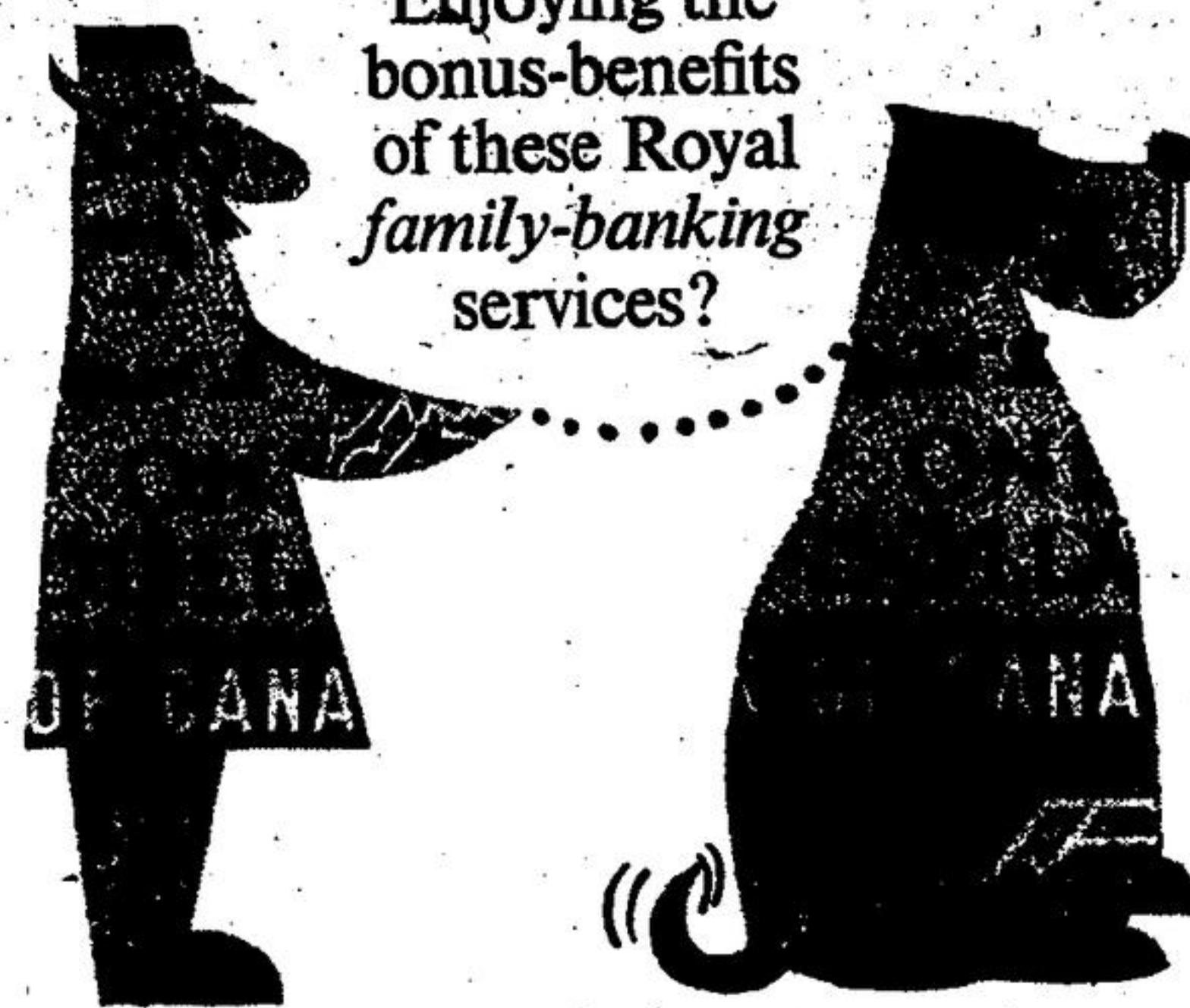
