Complaints Could Stiffen Town's Anti-Noise By-Law

"I brought you a petition a month ago and I've heard nothing about it since" said James Bellie, Edward St. as he asked council Monday about noise from a trucking firm which operates on the street.

"They run 24 hours a day, seven days a week," he continued.

Deputy Reeve Young said he had attempted to have a council committee study the problem but has not been able to get a seconder for his motion. He said the firm is not breaking any present law, as far as he knows.

Cr. Hyde said it is a police matter to investigate if there is any violation to the town's anti-noise by-law.

Cr. Speight said it is a tough subject, as the trucking firm was there before most of the houses. He has been promised every cooperation

from the owner, Robert Lane, in solving the problem, he said.

"I bought my land from Mr. Lane, so he has a moral obligation to me," interjected Mr. Bellie.

Cr. Harrison said the town solicitor is the one to be consulted.

"It's not as bad as when there was a firm unloading pipes a few years ago," he remarked.

Mayor Gibbons said the town needs more teeth in the anti-noise regulations.

"I was under the impression this noise had been eliminated," he said.

"I suggest we have our solicitor frame a new by-law."

He told Mr. Bellie he could count on council taking the matter up now that it had been brought to their attention again.

Georgetown Smoke Eaters Impressive, Win Parade Cup

The Georgetown's Volunteer Fire Department came home from the Ontario Volunteer Firemen's convention in Milton as award winners. Their smartness on parade earned them a special cup as best uniformed brigade in their class (over 20 members).

The conference was addressed by Mr. J.R. Bateman of the Ontario Fire Marshall's office, Toronto. He spoke generally of fire prevention methods in a brief address.

Many of the men moved into a little tent-town on the fairgrounds Friday, where they held a dance to get into the mood of things. Local people got used to the blare of sirens during the three days - and to seeing firemen swarm around the town. One man who remained cool and collected was Milton Fire Chief A.E. Clement who had a big job on his hands as host.

The Ontario firemen took over the county town for the entire weekend for their 65th annual conference. It was held in Milton's arena, and Milton firefighter George Bundy was the man of the moment - he was unanimously elected president of the association.

It was an event Milton won't forget for some time. Fire sirens intermittently rent the clear night air until the wee small hours every night, and the firemen, their wives and friends, even started a fire - their own massive barbecue outside the arena Saturday night.

Among the bands taking part were the Georgetown Girls Pipe Band. Sunday morning, another parade passed through town to the Cenotaph where a memorial service was held.

The historical and colourful parade filled the length of the town's main street that evening amid honks, blares, shouts, the booming of drums and the shrill notes of several pipe bands.
