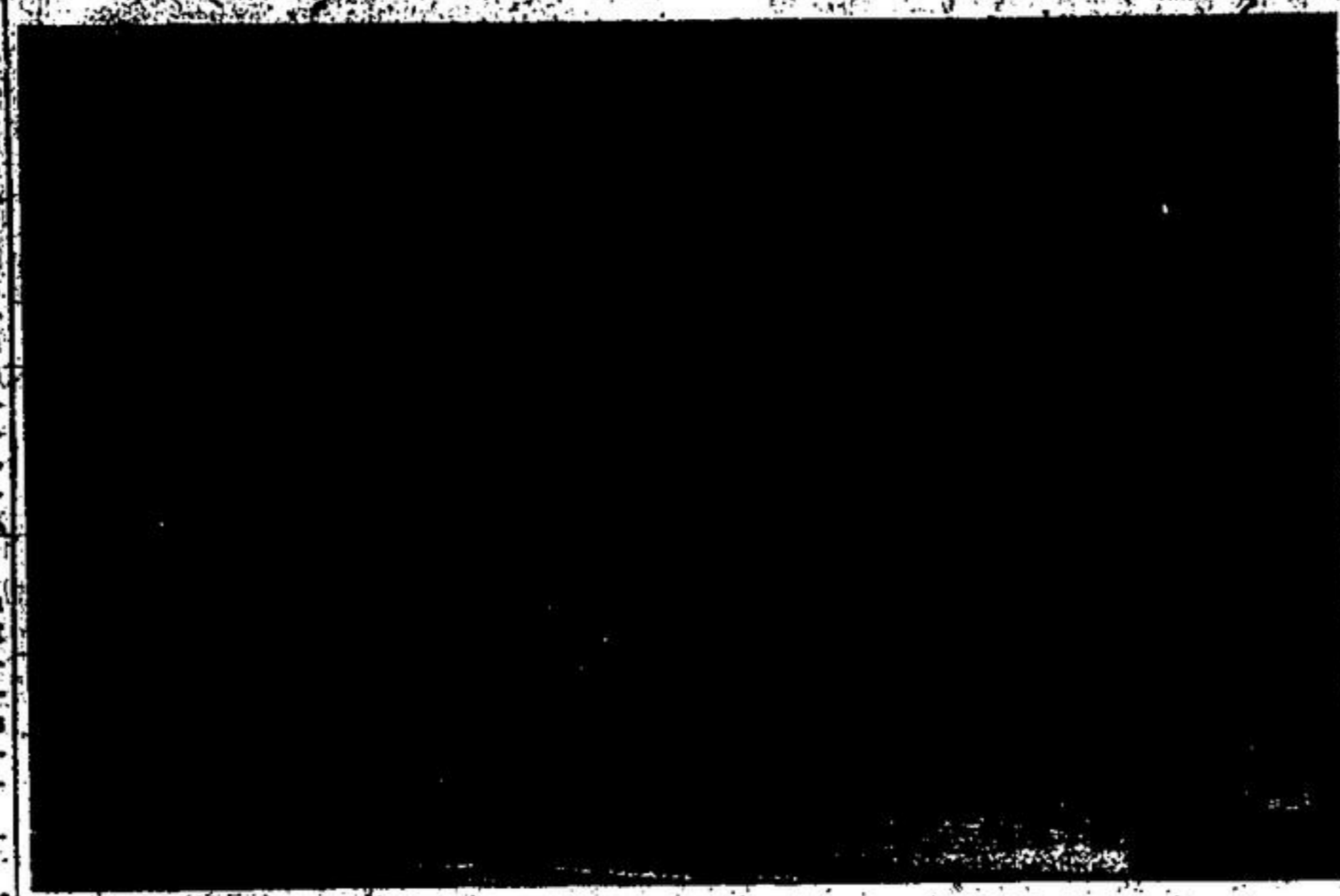
The facilities acquired from Federal - Mogul employ approximately 500 men and women. Product lines include door seals, deck-lid seals, motor mounts, and other automotive
