Agreement Increases Works Pay

Council Monday night unanimously endorsed the agreement with the Canadian Union of Public Service Employees giving a five per cent increase retroactive to April 1966, a five per cent increase August 1st, 1966, and a six per cent increase April 1st, 1967.
