**Telephone, Eavestroughs Relay Radio Programs in Hornby Home**

Doug Wood of R R 2, Hornby has a telephone with a difference.

Wood can merely pick up his telephone dial any number and get the CBC and he can sit back telephone to ear and listen to whatever is on the airwaves at the time, sometimes in French as well as English.

It's no magic. Just simple electronics physics.

**Old Farmhouse**

Wood lives in a remodelled farmhouse 1,200 feet from a CBC radio tower carrying programs over OBL and the Toronto French radio station, CJBC.

Radio engineers explain that a high frequency radio field and leakage from an underground cable are responsible for the telephone - cum - radio and many other weird occurrences, like music flowing from the eaves through downspouts, bulbs that glow after they are turned off and fluorescent lights that glow in the night held only in the bare hand.

"We've learned to live with it," says Wood.

"And you can bet it's a lot of fun when we've got guests around, especially if they've never heard about our funny house."

However, before his new guests think they've flipped their lids, Wood soothes them with an explanation.

It's not as bad as it once was, either.

**House Haunted**

Back in 1946, when the Woods bought the house on the Eighth Line near Highway 401 they thought the house was haunted.

Music could be heard by an old wire fence. It also came out of the downspout. And electricians who were wiring the house kept getting shocks and burns — even though the house was not hooked up with Hydro.

Wood said when wires were hooked into the fuse panels, 40 watt bulbs in the sockets began glowing.

"It got so bad that the hydro inspector pulled the electricians off the job," he said. "They weren't allowed back until hydro lines were strung up in front of the house, and a transformer hooked in."

The phenomenon had everyone including Wood himself —

completely mystified but not in the dark. The bulbs would glow for 24 hours a day, on or off.

**Strange Music**

Then one day, Wood heard the strange music by the downspout. And he heard an announcer give the CBL call letters.

It was a good clue. He followed it up and called the CBC. Soon engineers converged on the house and put everyone at ease with a logical explanation about the high frequency radio field and cable leakage.

With their new information, the Woods had a power transformer installed to stop the light glowing around the clock. They will still glow a few moments after being switched off.

And only when weather conditions are right now can the radio be heard over the downspout.

**Still Fun**

But the Woods still have fun with the high frequency field and fluorescent lights.

"Everybody likes to go over by the transmitter with the lights. The discharge from the cable leakage is picked up by the filaments and the lights glow in the hand."

"It must give people out on the highway a bit of a shock to see a mass of tubes moving about in the field," Wood said, laughing.

Although the power transformer has stopped most of the music from coming from odd places, the Woods still have no need for transistor radios.

They still hear music sometimes by the wire fence. And if that fails, there's always the telephone.

**Joe Schertzel, Fred Nurse Head R.O.P. for Holsteins**

The results of the 1965-66 Record of Performance for our Holstein herds has been announced by the Holstein-Friesian Association of Canada. A total of some 70-odd Pure Bred Holstein herds in Halton County are tested under ROP.

In the section for herds with at least twenty records reported — the winner was Mr. Jos. Schertzel, Norval, R. R. 1. He had: 33 records, 15,897 lbs. milk, 598 lbs. Butterfat, 3.76% test for a breed class average of 149 milk, 149 for fat.

Runner-up in this division was Jas. C. Reid, Norval R R 2, with 32 records — 15,308 lbs. milk, 571 lbs. Butterfat, 3.73% test, for a breed class average of 140 for milk, 142 for fat.

In third position was W. J. Mahon, Campbellville, R R 2, with 28 records: 14,271 lbs. Milk, 504 lbs. Butterfat, 4.08% test, for a Breed Class Average of 132 for Milk, 148 for Fat.

For herds with under 20 records reported, for the 3rd year out of the last five, Fred Nurse, Georgetown R R 2, was declared winner, with 13 records, 16,228 lbs. milk, 551 lbs. Butterfat 3.39% test, for a Breed Class Average of 150 for milk, 139 for Fat.

Students will go directly to the classroom assigned to them according to the lists posted in the halls beside the gymnasium and cafeteria. Students not on these lists will report to the library.

All Grade Nine, Ten, Eleven and Twelve Text Books will be provided by the High School Board. A student losing or damaging any of these books will be assessed for this loss or damage. All books provided will be collected after the examinations next June, or when a student leaves this school.

This year it will be necessary to run three lunch periods rather than two as in previous years. The first lunch period will be from 11.25 to 12.10, second lunch period from 12.10 to 12.55 and the third lunch period from 12.55 to 1.40. Approximately one third of the classes will go to lunch at a time, and the remaining two thirds will remain in class. This means that regular classes will be going on all day. The school will finish regular classes at 3.10 and the buses will leave at approximately the same time as last year. The lunch period for an individual class may vary from day to day depending on the timetable.

This year we will as well go on the Six Day Cycle. This means that it will take six days to complete the 42 periods rather than the five days as previous. The timetable will show Day 1, Day 2, etc., to Day 6. These days will not conform to the week days but will vary from week to week. This is an advantage in that the periods will be longer, each period being 45 minutes long, but there will only be seven-teaching periods a day, so that the total teaching time will be the same as before.
