Robert Francis, vice chairman of the Planning Board, explained that the Board had complaints from nearby residents, and these complaints were the first the Board ever heard about the alterations.

He explained that this area is noted as, which does not permit apartments. However, a building permit was issued, and Mr. Francis now asked that it be withdrawn until the situation is cleared up.

Just Turned 90. Western Pioneer Dies at Spalding

The death of Richard Henry Loynes, age 90, pioneer resident of Lac Vert, Sask., occurred in Spalding hospital on Tuesday, July 26th. Funeral service was held in Bethany United Church on Saturday, July 30th, conducted by Rev. Robert Thompson.

Mr. Loynes is survived by his loving wife Anna, two sons Archie of Naicam and Lloyd of Lac Vert; one daughter, Vera, (Mrs. H. Fader) of North Surrey, B.C., and two brothers, Irwin and Frank of Manitoba.

He was born June 8th, 1876, near Brampton, Ontario, and moved with his family to Roseville Manitoba, in March, 1910.

In July, 1905, he filed on a homestead in Lac Vert district and took up permanent residence in October 1906. He returned to Ontario to marry Anna Barber, teacher (principal) of Norval School, Ont., on January 26th, 1910. They returned directly to Lac Vert and farmed there until 1951 when they retired and moved to Naicam where they have since resided.

Mr. Loynes was active in many community affairs. In 1923 he became a member of the first Wheat Pool Committee. In Lac Vert, a position he held until being made a life member in 1950. He was the first president of the Lac Vert agricultural Society formed in 1921 and served for several years as a director of the Forage Crop Association at Prince Albert.

He was a devout and active member of the Methodist Church, and since 1925, United Church. He was a member of the first Church Board at Lac Vert until Bethany United Church was built in 1939, and was made an Honorary Life Member in 1964.

Interment took place in Naicam Community Cemetery.

Cr. Speight added that he thought the permit was taken out in a legal manner, but perhaps not an ethical manner. The mayor reminded Council that copies of the permit must be in the engineer's office, and it should be a simple matter to find out in whose name it was issued.

"I understood permits for apartments still had to come through council" said Mr. Francis. "I would like to emphasize that the Planning Board is not necessarily opposed, especially if an amount like \$300,000 is being spent to renovate. But we are opposed to being uninformed, or not consulted on the matter."

"I wonder in what position the corporation may find itself if we put a stop order on the building when a permit was issued," opined Cr. Speight.

No decision will be made until the matter is investigated further.
