## Georgetown Native Noted as Fuel Research Worker

A man who went on from his cousin of the groom and Rob- rie Duncan of Port . Credit, early days in Georgetown to become an outstanding research worker died in Ottawa recently.

Robert O. King, 91, whose research spanned submarines in war and aircraft in peace, died there after several years of failing health. Illness had forced his retirement seven years ago after more than half a century.

His last position was combustion research chief of the Defence Research Board where he had been associated with the University of Toronto experimenting with hydrogen as an engine fuel.

His first research was undertaken as a post graduate student at McGill University before

His work with the Defence Research Board began with its formation after the war. He had continued writing scientific papers after his retirement.

Mr. King's father operated King Foundries, one of Georgetown's earlier industries and later was in the greenhouse business here.

The family has a plot in Greenwood Cemetery, and Mr. King's ashes will be interred
