The "Topix" have been together since May, and play mostly around this area.

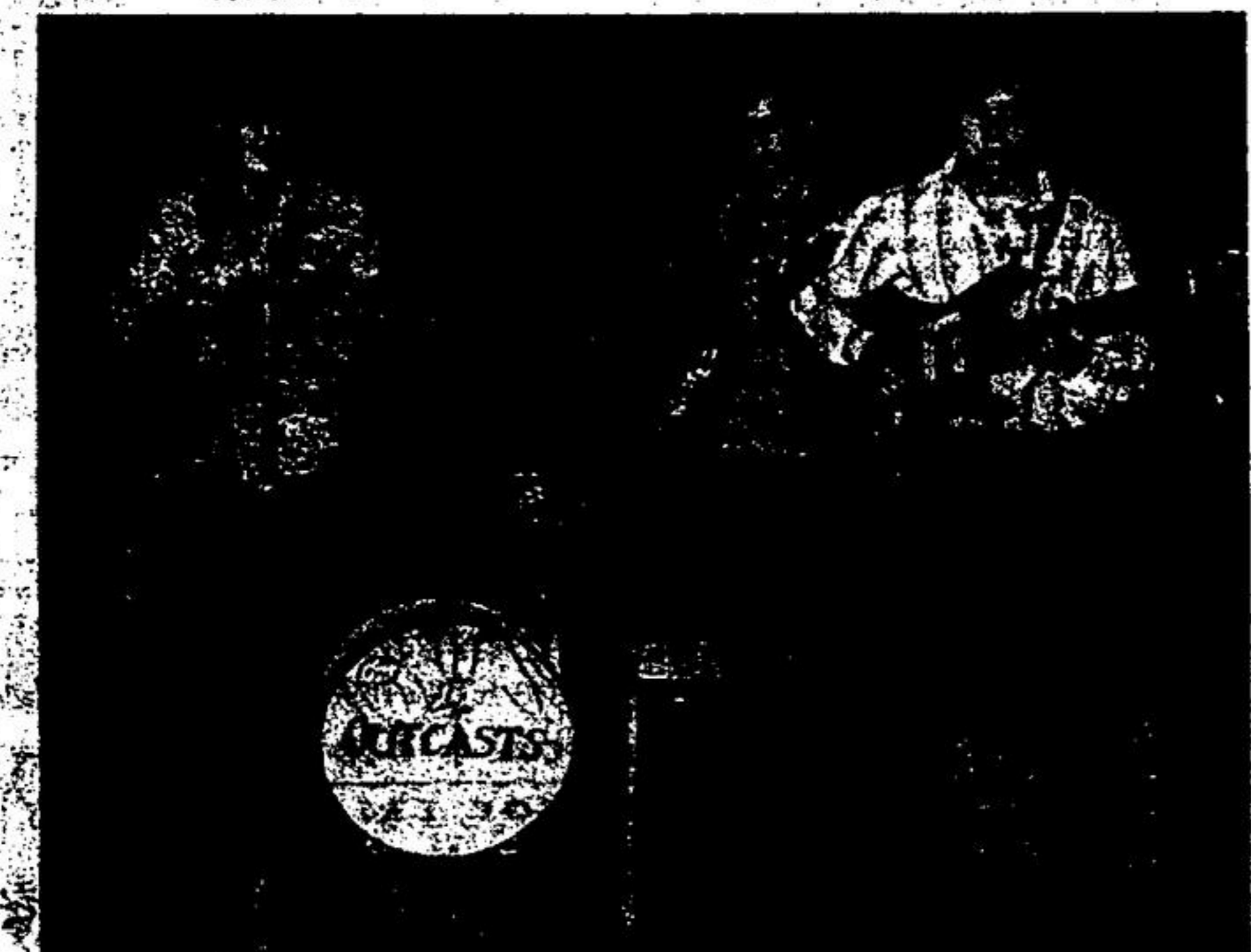

# Georgetown Native Noted as Fuel Research Worker

A man who went on from his early days in Georgetown to become an outstanding research worker died in Ottawa recently.

Robert O. King, 91, whose research spanned submarines in war and aircraft in peace, died there after several years of failing health. Illness had forced his retirement seven years ago after more than half a century.

His last position was combustion research chief of the Defence Research Board where he had been associated with the University of Toronto experimenting with hydrogen as an engine fuel.

His first research was undertaken as a post graduate student at McGill University before 1900.

His work with the Defence Research Board began with its formation after the war. He had continued writing scientific papers after his retirement.

Mr. King's father operated King Foundries, one of Georgetown's earlier industries and later was in the greenhouse business here.

The family has a plot in Greenwood Cemetery, and Mr. King's ashes will be interred here.

# New Toronto Woman Was Once Terra Cotta Storekeeper

Well known in the Terra Cotta district where with her husband she operated a general store for 22 years, Mrs. James L. Craine, 75, died in Our Lady of Mercy Hospital, Toronto, on August 31st.

The former Martha (Dolly) Dawson, she was born in Sheffield, England, and came to Canada with her parents, Mr and Mrs. William Dawson in 1913. The next year she married Mr. Craine and they continued to live in Terra Cotta until 1940. They operated a store in what is now Terra Cotta Inn from 1918 to 1940. Since then they had lived in New Toronto.

She was a member of Century United Church, New Toronto.

She leaves two sisters, Mrs. Charles Ledwidge (Lizzie) and Mrs. Harry Hayward (Lily) of Georgetown.

Rev. Ian Fleming conducted the funeral service on Friday at the Harold C. McClure Funeral Home here with interment in Greenwood Cemetery.

Pallbearers were Tom and Walter Hayward, Guelph, Fred Lyons, Leslie Icam, Gordon Stringer and Albert Dawson.
