HARLEY TO HALTON

Weekly Observations by

THE PARLIAMENT of Canada has been recalled to consider the railway strike, and railway legislation. This is necessary because a strike of railway workers and the resulting loss of railway services is a national crisis and must be settled as soon as possible.

THE BILL WAS passed in principle (second reading) by the same party votes as before with the exception of one Conservative, Mr. Nowlan, who voted with the Government. The Government then agreed, as asked by the Opposition, to place in the Bill Judge Munroe's recommendation for 1967 guaranteeing at least 10% for that year and bringing the total raise over the 2 year period to at least 18 per cent as previously outlined. This is still a guaranteed minimum, and the final figure will be arrived at by mediation between the railways and the unions representing the workers or, if this fails, by compulsory arbitration.

AT 12:20 ON Thursday morning, having considered and passed four of the eleven clauses, the House recessed for the night to meet at 10:00 a.m. to continue the discussion, expecting to finish the Bill sometime that day and refer it to the Senate.

THE LEADER OF the Opposition moved an amendment to kill this Bill which was eventually defeated by the combined Liberal, Social Credit and Creditist Parties and the three Independent Members. On Monday evening and the Tuesday evening an attempt to prolong the sitting late into the night was prevented on the first occasion by the Conservative Party and on the second occasion

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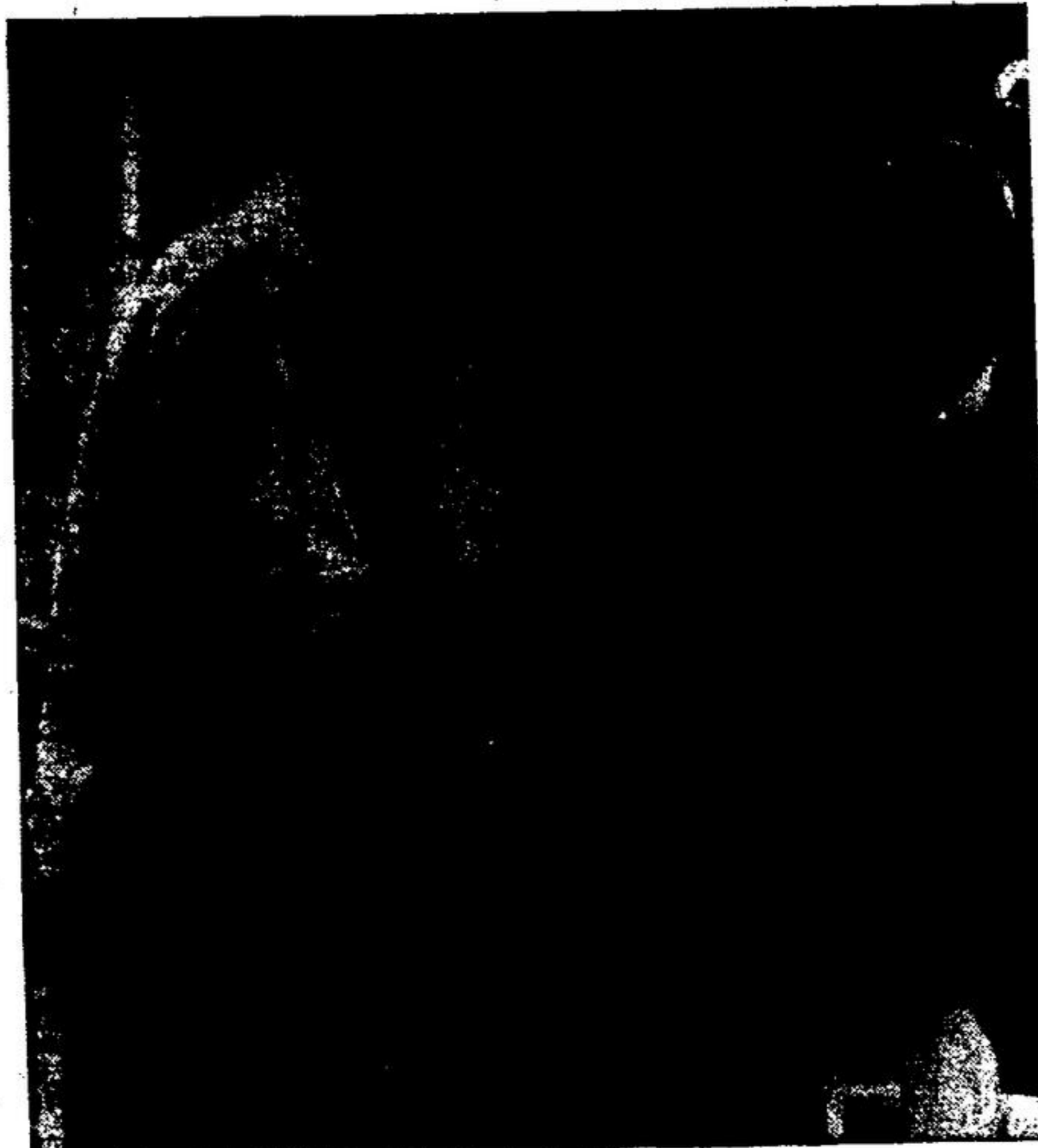
