Served Church in India New First Baptist Pastor

An induction service is planned in First Baptist Church next Monday evening for Rev. Leslie E. Wilton, who became pastor of the church on September 1st. He succeeds Rev. Lloyd Whan, who joined the Department of Reform Institutions at Millbrook as a chaplain.

Mr. and Mrs. Wilton returned from Moncton, New Brunswick last week-end, where they had said farewell to members of Brentwood United Baptist Church, a new church which he had helped establish and which he had served as pastor.

Mr. Wilton was born on a farm in Caradoc Township west of London. He received his early education in Stratford and later graduated after receiving his degree in theology. The same year he married Miss Alma Osborne of Bronte and they left Canada as appointees of the Canadian Baptist Foreign Mission Board.

During twenty eight years in India, Mr. Wilton served in many capacities which included evangelization, education, publishing in both English and Telugu, and the administration of various mission institutions ranging from land settlement to the business management of a hospital. Later he was principal of the School of Theology and devoted his time to the training of young men to minister in the 160 churches of the mission.

During World War II, Mr. Wilton left the mission for a year, serving as an emergency officer of the Indian government in eastern Bengal and Assam. He later served in the same area as senior secretary of the army YMCA, ministering to the recreational needs of Indian, British, American, African and Chinese troops.

In 1955 the Wiltons were in

Canada and a health handicap ruled out further service in India. He served as pastor of First Baptist Church, Tillsonburg, for three years, when he was invited to join the staff of the United Baptist Bible Training School in Moncton, N.B. Mrs. Wilton has been secretary of the same school.

In 1961 Mr. Wilton began spending his out of class hours pioneering a new Baptist cause in the new Brentwood subdivision there, which led to the establishment of the church which he served as pastor.

The Wiltons have four sons and a daughter, all married. Rev. Ralph Wilton is minister of Donway Baptist Church, Don Mills; John is chief accountant with Technamation of Canada and lives in Willowdale; Paul is a law student at Dalhousie, Halifax; Rev. David is completing post graduate studies at Cornell University and is under appointment to leave for India early in 1967; Grace, Mrs. Ross McKinlay, teaches school in Cobourg.

Town Sells 3 Acre Parcel On Todd Rd To R.A.D. Const.

Georgetown will have its first industrial mall if plans being made by a building firm materialize.

On Monday, council passed two readings of a by-law which will sell a 3 acre industrial property on Todd Rd. and option two similar lots to R.A.D. (Peel Ltd.) Construction Co.

Ray Odorico and Al Paludi, two Port Credit residents who have already done considerable industrial and apartment building here, plan to build 48,000 square feet of factory space

over a four year period. Cr. Ern Hyde said.

"They have customers knocking at their door for this type of building," said Cr. Fred Harrison.

Cr. Roy Ballentine expressed concern that there is little tax revenue until a floor is put in a factory, and if space is not rented and no floor installed, the town treasury suffers. Cr. Hyde said he would check on the possibility of altering the sale agreement to include this before the deal goes through.

Town Employees Choose Fendley As Union Head

Was Papermill Engineer Then With Kennedy Firm

A man who travelled to many parts of the world installing machinery for the Kennedy firm in Owen Sound, Treff Joseph Imbeau, 72, died September 10 at Belleville.

Mr. and Mrs. Imbeau had been en route from their home in St. Catharines to Ottawa the week before to attend a wedding when he became ill. He died in Belleville Hospital where he had been taken for treatment.

A native of Renfrew, he was a graduate of Queen's University in chemical engineering. He was employed for several years in Georgetown with Provincial Paper, Ltd. before joining the Kennedy firm.

He had lived in St. Catharines for some years.

He leaves his wife, the former Erma Ryan of Georgetown, one daughter, Mrs. Richard Crans of Victoria, B.C. and several brothers and sisters.

Requiem mass was held in St. Catherine of Alexandria Cathedral, St. Catharines last Tuesday and interment was in Victoria Lawn Cemetery.

Town council meetings will be streamlined in future by adoption of two suggestions made by Cr. Bill Smith on Monday.

There was agreement that instead of reading detailed lists of accounts, each councillor or would receive an advance copy of bills to be paid, and these would be passed in total with comment only if a councillor wished information on a specific item.

Agreed too was to abandon reading of the minutes of the last meeting. Here, too, councillors will receive a copy which will provide each with a file of the year's business.

Cr. Smith's third suggestion stumbled on a 4-4 split vote.

He wanted routine correspondence dealt with by the municipal staff or relevant committee with the town clerk to have discretion over what would be read in open council.

"That could be like having a secret service," quipped Cr. Harrison, who lined up with the mayor, reeve and Cr. Hyde in voting it down.

Cr. Hyde said the ones should not be placed on the clerk. An item which might be unimportant to one councillor could mean something to another, he said.

"A little too far at the moment, though Cr. Smith's intent is all right," said the mayor.

Reeve Hunter said he favours a synopsis of lengthy routine letters as is sometimes done.

Cr. Emmerson said the idea would be to separate the wheat from the chaff to save council time. Cr. Ballentine said such a change would mean action would be taken more promptly on many complaints which now must wait for official presentation to council.

Cr. Smith pointed out that over an hour had been spent in reading correspondence at the meeting that night, which could have been used for discussion.

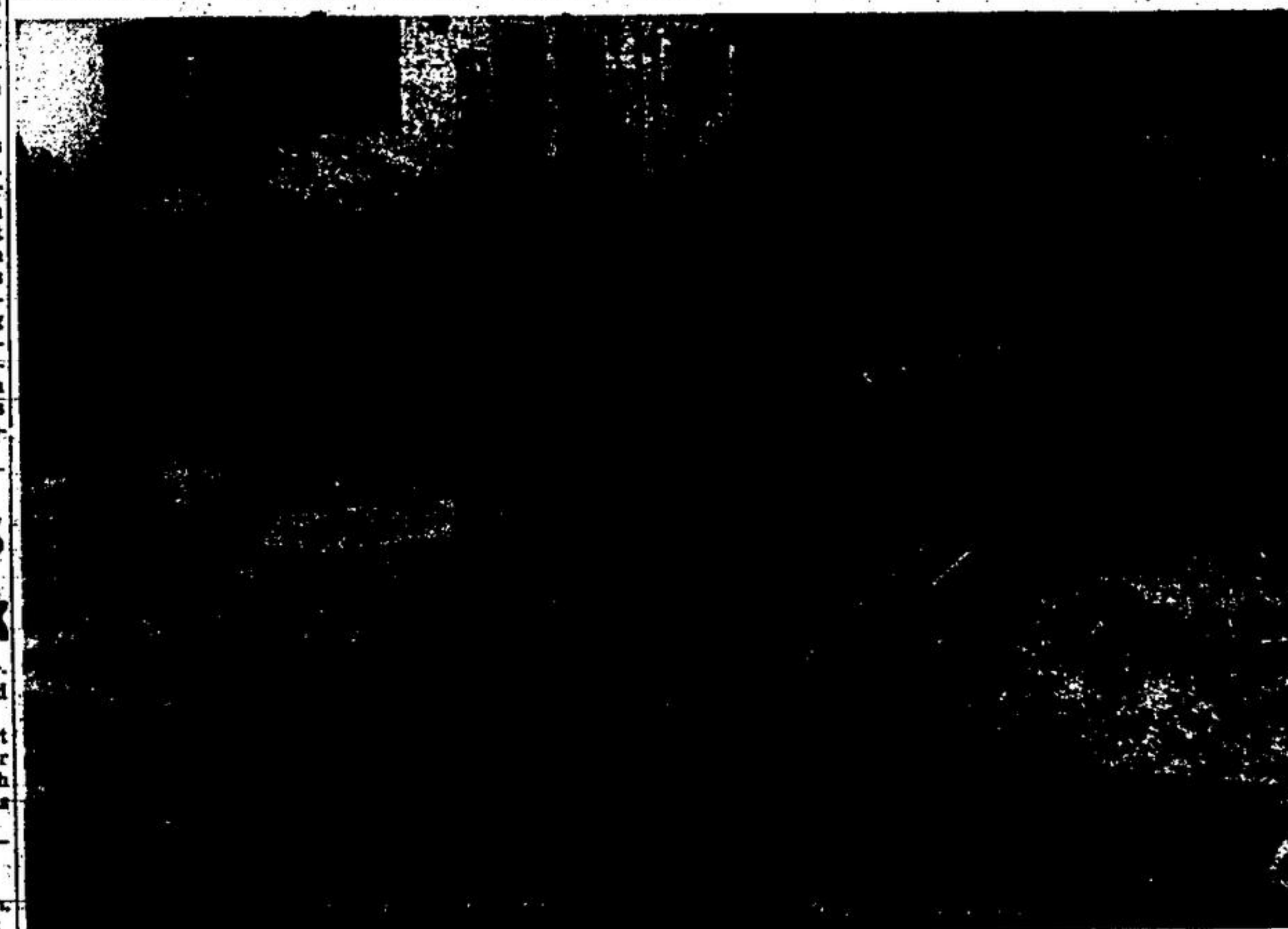
The new enrolments brought to 93 the number of members from Smith & Stone.

DEMOLISH DOWNTOWN BUILDING



AGE OLD WALLS COME TUMBLING DOWN

DEMOLITION OF THE FORMER CORDARO BUILDING which anchors the north end of the downtown business section is into its second week and already most of the rear of the three storey block has been reduced to rubble. The demolition will progress in stages eventually eliminating the entire building from the downtown scene. Of recent years the building has contained apartment units, two shops and a sub-ground level meeting hall. It once contained a restaurant and candy factory, and was originally Creelman's knitting machine factory.
