

Perseverance, Persuasion, Perspiration Formal For Slimnastics Course Pupils

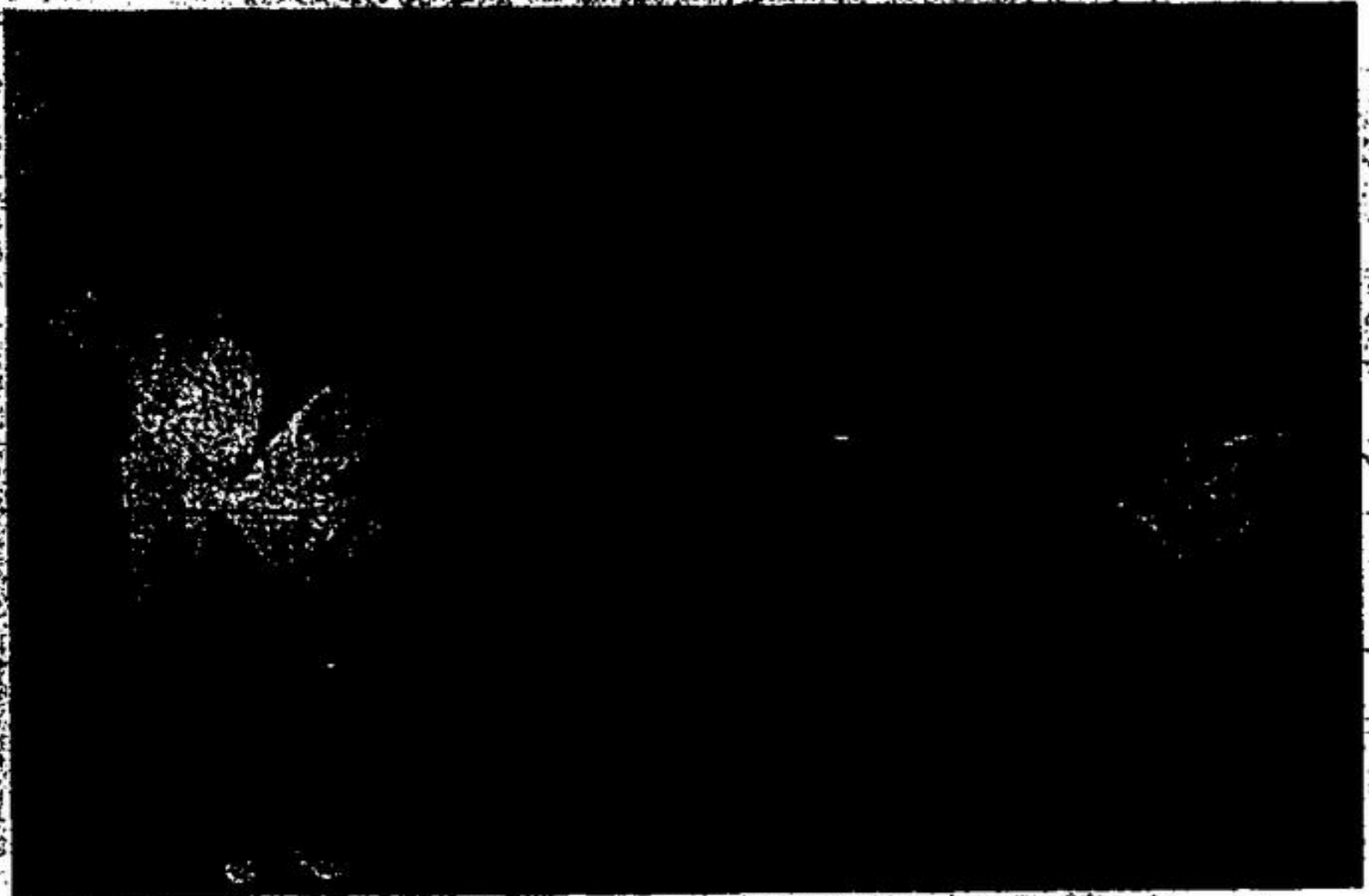

Overseas Jaunt Delays Jail Planning Action

Action on the proposed Halton-Peel regional jail will be delayed until late fall, a member of the five-man regional jail committee predicted this week.

Gordon Gallagher, reeve of Burlington, said that several members of the committee are now in Europe on a government sponsored tour.

He noted that a private firm is now examining a "centrally located" parcel of property for the jail site.

The price of the land will determine the acreage purchased, he said, the minimum lot size will be 25 acres.

Recent reports of the Halton and Peel County Grand Juries have hampered existing jail facilities and called for the immediate erection of a new jail.
