

Halton, Peel Future in Plunkett Recommendations

The long awaited Plunkett report will be made public at a special dinner tonight in the Catholic Youth Centre in Oakville, it was disclosed at Halton County Council last week.

Invitations to the dinner were mailed Tuesday September 30th, but members of County Council were concerned with a report that only two representatives of each municipality would be invited. This was to have included the mayor and reeve, thus eliminating the deputy reeve in a town which would have a mayor.

Reeve H. Merry, acting warden, pointed out that the deputy-reeves should be excluded, "and after all Halton and Peel Counties are paying the shot" he explained the cost of the report is being shared equally by Halton and Peel.

A resolution protesting this action was passed by Council, but later in the meeting after a phone call to Dr. Cummings it seemed the deputy reeves would be included.

Councillors were under the impression that chairmen of Planning Boards and Boards of Education were also to be included.

The report has been more than a year in preparation, with submissions being received from many organizations and individuals.

Street Widening Delay Hardship on Family

John J. Emmerson, 181 Main St. North who has been in a dilemma about his property for some years, with the town owning his laneway and a few years ago a neighbour legally cutting off his access route, told council Monday night that the holders of his mortgage are foreclosing and he and his large family have to get out, this week-end.

He claimed that the continual cutting down of the hill in front of his house to give him access, had eroded it so much it was falling away. "Until the house is moved back and the piece of my property taken by the town as was planned I can not raise a mortgage."

Reeve W. Hunter pointed out that the plans for widening Ontario Street are supposed to be ready by the end of this month. "We do intend to take about thirty feet of Mr. Emmerson's property, and at one time we talked about moving his house back about forty feet and putting it on a new foundation. This doesn't help the present financial situation, however," he said.

Cr. Harrison raised the question of the town expropriating the whole thing, house and property then after the road

widening, offering it back to Mr. Emmerson first.

"I've never been able to understand the town's liability in this case" contended the mayor. "What part of a town road does Mr. Emmerson's house occupy?"

"The house is not on town property at all," replied Mr. Emmerson, "and some years ago when it was taken to court it was established that the street belongs to the town, not to me as I thought at the time." He explained that when he bought the house there was a lovely row of trees in front of the house, but the town had to cut them down to give him access to his house as the ground on the hill keeps sliding away.

The mayor urged him to have his lawyer explain to the clerk just what the town's position and responsibility is.

Cr. W. Smith appeared troubled and asked if there was no immediate action could be taken "if there's any responsibility on the town's part, and this man has to vacate I don't want to be part of that" he stated.
