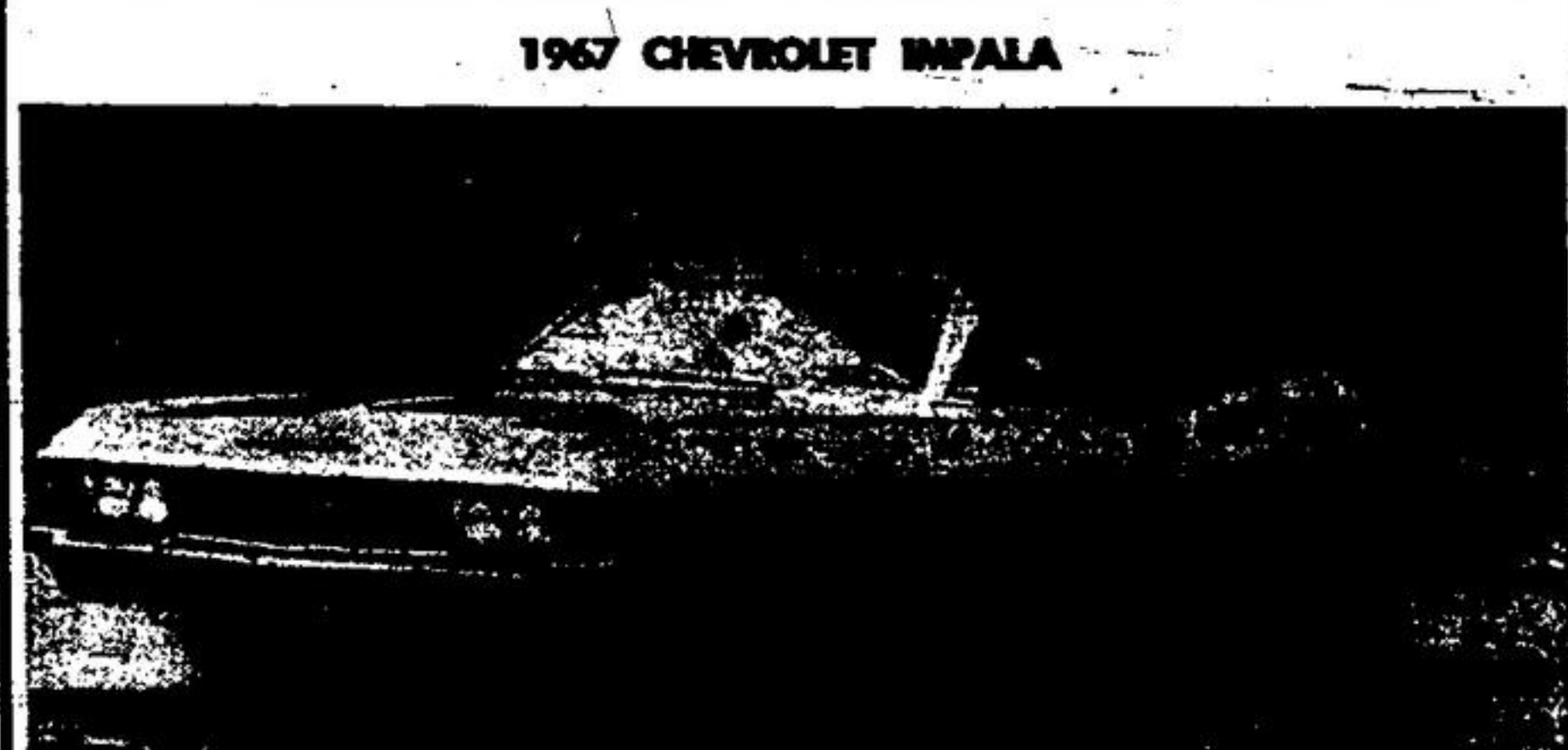

Figures released by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics show the population has increased from 18,467 in 1961 to 35,909 in 1966.

The figures were contained in a preliminary report of the federal census taken last June. Complete results of the census for all communities in Canada will be released later.

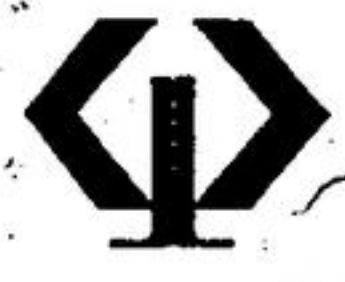
