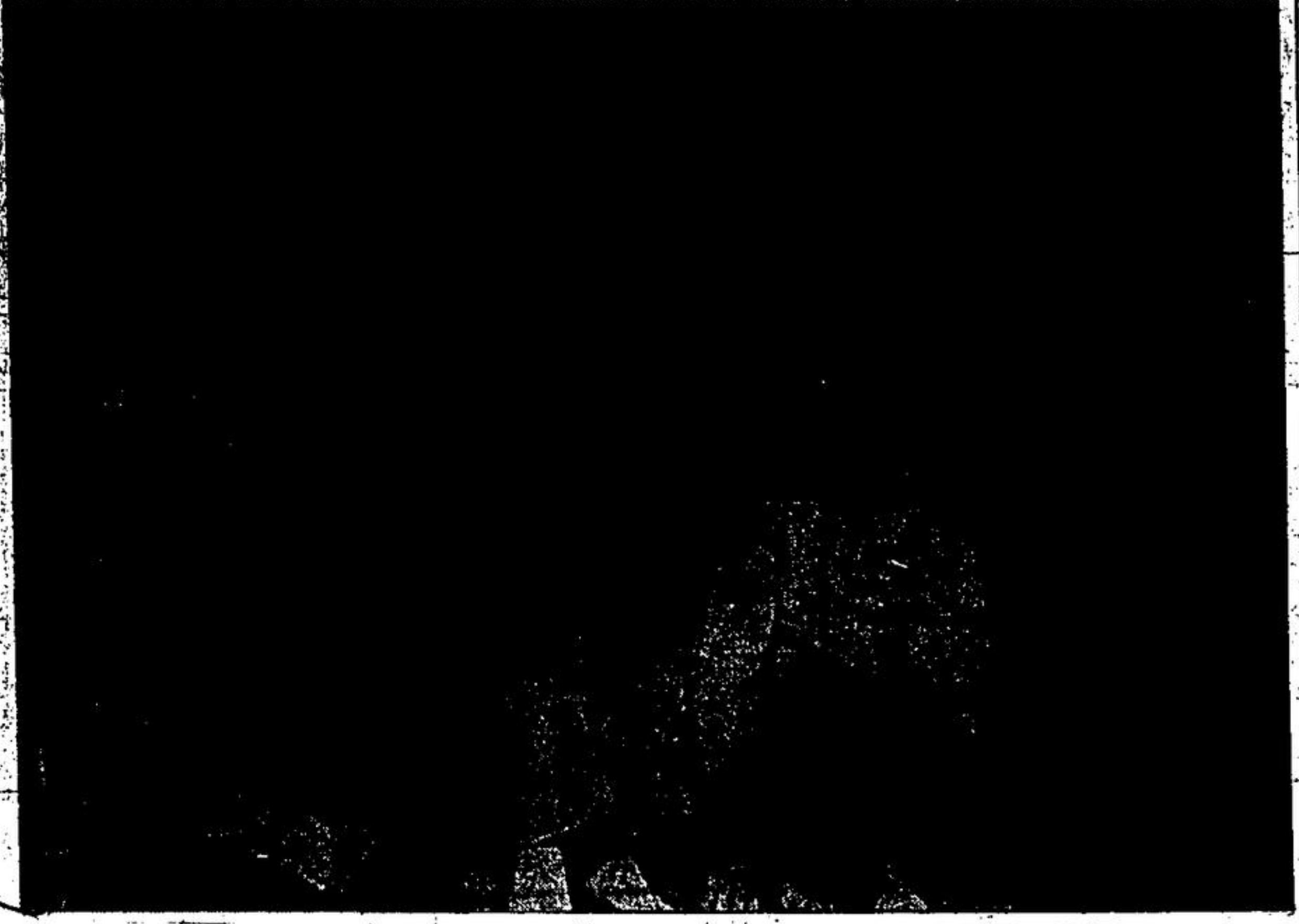

Council of Women Hear How Public Library Mushroomed

Librarian Miss Marjorie Nader detailed the history of Georgetown public library in a talk to members of the Local Council of Women on Sept. 23. She traced its origin from 1899 in a room over a hardware store on Main St. with only a handful of volumes, a part-time librarian and little local support. She recounted with insight and humour its sometimes difficult and uphill progress to today when it is an invaluable asset to the people of the district. There are now 14,000 books. There are 6000 adult and 2800 junior subscribers and last year there was a total circulation of 87,000 volumes.
