Floor or Not, Town Assured of Taxes

The third reading of the by-
law confirming the sale of a
three acre parcel of land on
Todd Road to R.A.D. Construc-
tion was given at Council Mon-
day night.

Added to the by-law was a
clause stipulating that the pur-
chaser agrees to pay the town
the amount equal to taxes by
December 31st, if the floor is
not in within two months after
the completion of the walls and
and roof.

This was done at the sugges-
tion of Cr. Ballentine who last
week pointed out that there is
little tax revenue until a floor
is put in a factory, and if not
rented the factory could be left
without a floor for some time.

Also in doubt, but with a few
more registered are the follow-
ing, Beginners' Shorthand, Hair-
dressing, Small Engines, Mach-
ine Shop, Mechanical Drafting,
and Elementary Bookkeeping.
A minimum registration of
fifteen is required to form a
class.
Since the courses to be offer-
ed are still in doubt the teach-
ers have not yet been hired.
