



North Halton OPP detachment's new headquarters

The North Halton detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police moved into their new headquarters last week and by the start of this week it was "business as usual" in their new home at the intersection of the Base Line and No. 25 Highway, near Milton.

The \$50,000 building was completed last week by crews from Snow Construction of Oakville. "Operation Shift" began

early Wednesday morning at the detachment's former quarters on Bronte St. in Milton. Only delay in the plans is a lack of new furniture. It has been ordered but shipment has been held up for another five weeks, said Sgt. W. J. Grant, who heads the 26 member force.

The new building has just been neatly landscaped and a new lighted OPP sign has been

installed. Two flag poles flank the front door entranceway. Inside is large general office where constables' desks will be located, plus a separate office for the Sergeant, one office for the three Corporals, one office for the two stenographers a radio room, and an interrogation room. At the rear of the building are a kitchen, two washrooms, a two-cell lock up and a two-car indoor heated garage with storage space.

Outside on the west end are a paved parking lot for police vehicles and stone topped general parking lot for employees and visitors. The heating is all-electric.

The North Halton detachment is located in Esquew Township, including Glen Williams, Norval, Stewarttown, and Limehouse in the Georgetown vicinity, as well as Nassagaweya Twp. and Hwy. 401 through Halton County.

Who Can Give Blood At October 17 Clinic

The Red Cross is the only agent for collecting blood in Ontario.

WHO BENEFITS — Any patient in any of the 42 hospitals in Ontario, in fact — anywhere in Canada.

WHO CAN GIVE — Anyone in average good health, 18-65 years.

HOW OFTEN — Donors may give every three months if desired.

HOW LONG — Only 30 minutes including test, rest and refreshment are required.

HOW MUCH — Less than 2/3 pint — about 1/16th of body's supply (Replaced in quantity within 24 hours. 1 pint is 600 c.c. The actual donation is 380 c.c.)

WHEN AND WHERE — Three clinics per year in Georgetown. The third and last clinic of this year will be held at Knox Presbyterian Church Hall, Main Street South (beside the Public Library) on Monday, October 17, 1966.

DIET — No restrictions — may eat anything before donating.

HEALTH — Donors should be in average good health but will not be accepted for the following reasons:

- 1) Jaundice — anytime after 3 months of birth.
- 2) Malaria — within past year.
- 3) Asthma or Hayfever — if active — or taking allergy injections.
- 4) Colds, Flu, Boils — within past week or if antibiotics being taken.
- 5) Pregnancy — during and for 6 months following confinement.
- 6) Surgery — major within 6 months, minor — 3 months.
- 7) Small Pox vaccination — within 2 weeks.
- 8) Other chronic illnesses such as:

Cancer, Diabetes, Epilepsy, Ulcers, Tuberculosis, Heart conditions, kidney disease, prolonged fever.

N.B. "Polio" immunization injections and the use of the birth control pill ARE NOT a cause of non-acceptance.
