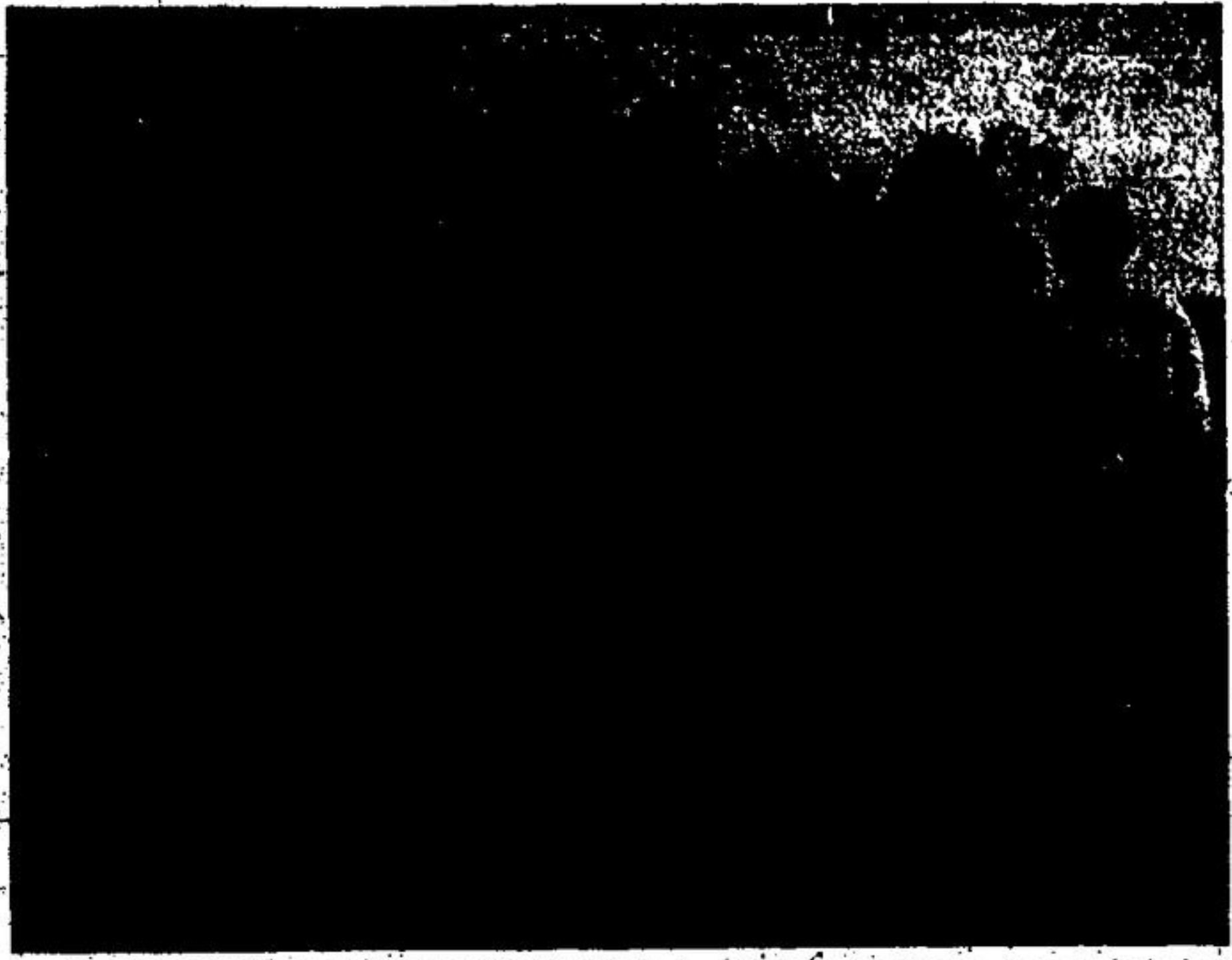


"GOSH WE DID IT"

Fergus Football Seniors Swamped by 'Rebels'

Georgetown High School's senior football machine ran over, around and through Fergus seniors to hammer their competition 59 to 6 in a CWO-SSA District 10 Football League in Georgetown park Monday afternoon. The win was Georgetown's third in as many starts.

Originally scheduled for Friday, the game was pushed to Monday because of fall fair preparations.

As the score would indicate the game was no contest from the opening whistle. Both GDHS coaches Thompson and McLaren were concerned that this game would do more harm than good in preparing for the tough encounter with Guelph Collegiate today.

The Georgetown team substituted freely after the opening minutes of the game, but regardless of what combination of players were on the field, the points kept rolling up. A missed assignment in the defensive backfield along with a poor interior pass rush allowed the Fergus quarterback to complete a 30 yard pass for their only score.

The local defensive crew averaged the first major against them by scoring four of their own to complement the fine offensive display. Kynnersley and Rayner ran back pass interceptions for touchdowns. Al Ferguson scooted 45 yards with a punt return Lynn Mackenzie blocked a punt and Don Parsons recovered the ball in the end zone.

Offensively Doug Hills darted 60 yards off tackle for a score on the first play from scrimmage. Quarterback Dwyer rolled out and ran over two piches for two more and Dwyer, who passed well all game, threw to Cook for another.

Both the offensive and defensive lines must receive most of the credit for the win. The defensive line by Bull, McKinnon, Bennett, Irwin and line backer Larry Bradley, continuously gave the ball back to the offense. Todd, Smith, Kerr, Coolidge, McKenzie and Turnbull opened gaping holes in the Fergus defense.

The next home game will be Thursday, October 6th against Guelph Collegiate.

GDHS Soccer Team Loses 3-1 to Milton

The Georgetown District High School soccer team lost its first game, three goals to one, at the hands of Milton at the park Thursday.

The first half was scoreless as Milton could not find the range. They scored three goals, however, in about twenty minutes of the second half. The first was headed in, the second

a long kick, and the third a breakaway scoring play. Georgetown's forward line carried the play late in the game. Full-back R. Smith almost scored on a powerful drive from twenty-five yards out. Minutes later right outsider Moravac centred, and in the ensuing scramble a Milton player punched the ball into the net. Dowdney was the last player to touch the ball for Georgetown. In the absence of the official referee there was confusion as to whether or

not a goal had been scored. Smith was called upon to take the penalty shot and scored.

The Georgetown team played rather poorly, being unorganized much of the time. That situation resulted in part from the inability of the defense to clear the ball effectively in the first half. As a result, centre forward R. Smith went back to play defensive centre half. Although the clearing improved noticeably, the forward line with its new formation was uncoordinated and failed to take advantage.

Special mention should be given to emergency goalie Bob Hand, whose new role between the uprights was unexpectedly well executed. He had little or no chance on the goals and made several plays. Fullbacks Lenz and Conle were called upon repeatedly to repulse the attacking Milton forwards.
