Cattle entries were somewhat down this year, but the sheep classes overflowed the pens — 202 being exhibited.

Food booths were operated by the Barbershoppers, Kinsmen and Kinettes, Hornby Anglican Guild and Ballinacraigh W.I.

As usual the new cars were well displayed by Murray Motors, Masson Motors, Park Motors and C&V Motors. Other commercial exhibits included Master Feeds, Halton Co-Op, Co-Op Insurance, Hornby Garage, Norm McDonald's trailers, The Cancer Society also had a booth, as did the Figure Skating Club, the Junior Hockey Club and the Radicals Car Club.

Vince Mountford was master of ceremonies for the afternoon and was assisted by Ralph Ursel on the organ. Georgetown Girls Pipe Band added color to the fair.

The exhibit hall was a profusion of color with fall flowers, home baking, ladies and children's work. A good crowd availed themselves of the opportunity to view this exhibit on Friday evening. Bernard Strubsole provided music during the evening on the Baldwin organ provided by Paul Barber. The Horticultural Society had their usual fine exhibit, and Norval public school's display at the end of the hall added a fine touch of artistry. The exhibits of the local women's institute groups were a highlight of the hall.

The midway seemed to attract a big crowd both Friday evening and Saturday afternoon. A good variety of rides were available for the kiddies, and the smell of french fries, hot dogs and popcorn put the crowd in the holiday spirit.

The Lions Club assisted the fair board in looking after the gate, members of the banks' staff sold tickets and the firemen policed the grounds, with the help of the town police force.

**CHRISTIAN AND MISSIONARY ALLIANCE ESTABLISH CHURCH**

Another Christian church, new to Georgetown, commenced services here Sunday evening.

The Christian and Missionary Alliance held its first service in Georgetown in Centennial Park conducted by Mr. Paul Collins, the new pastor.

Mr. Collins, a recent graduate of Nyack Missionary College told the Herald that the Alliance will eventually build a permanent building in Georgetown and is interested in a site in the town's extreme east end.

The local congregation will be meeting in the meantime at the Community Centre Building in Centennial Park each Sunday with Sunday School convening at 10 a.m. followed by morning worship. An evening service will be held at 7:00 o'clock.

"When you visit any Alliance church you will never be embarrassed by excesses or extremes," Mr. Collins said. "You will hear a straightforward evangelical thrust in the sermon that gives centrality to Jesus Christ as He is revealed in the Scriptures. Because of the missionary emphasis in the program, you will probably leave the service with the feeling that

you have found a Christian congregation which is not 'ingrown' but unselfishly obeying the commands of Christ to take His Gospel everywhere." Mr. Collins commented.

Founded in 1887 under the leadership of the late Rev. A. B. Simpson a Presbyterian Minister, relatively small group rates seventh among Protestants in foreign mission activities. It comes close after such denominational giants as the Presbyterians, Baptists and Methodists.



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
